December Bio: Hiltrud Lu

After the war, some Polish soldiers gave stamps and instruction to Hiltrud and her young friends. These soldiers were employed by the British as part of the occupation forces in her home in Löningen, a small German town on the Dutch border.

Subsequently, Hiltrud and a friend started a stamp club. This remained active for many years until she moved to the U.S. in the early 1960s. Once her children were grown, she joined PSLC and has remained very active ever since.

Hiltrud credits stamp collecting with success in geography in school. It instilled an interest in foreign travel. Beyond her many journeys, she has lived in the U.K. and Switzerland.

After graduating from business school, Hiltrud added numerous international contacts to her many family members and friends. These people form a global network who save stamps for her world collection.

"When I get an envelope of stamps from a friend or a member of my family, I know that they have been thinking of me." She adds that "My stamps have gotten me through the difficult times; they are good medicine, and they are my friends." This is something with which many stamp collectors will agree.

Hiltrud has four children, a daughter each in Boston and NYC, and two sons in Lancaster. Three showed an interest in stamp collecting while younger, but the appeal has since waned. Two years ago this month, her husband, Milton passed away.



Memories: A friend, a lapsed stamp collector, shared about one of his favorite Christmas gifts, a mint \$5 Alexander Hamilton stamp from the Liberty Series (Scott 1053). It completed his set. For a kid, this was the holy grail. He already owned a cancelled copy of the \$5 Calvin Coolidge from the Prexies (834), but that was relatively inexpensive, even back in the 1970s.


The conversation transported me to my seasonal haul. My best gift was in 7th grade, the Scott's green and unabridged U.S. National album with illustrations and spaces for all the B·O·B.

This Scott's replaced my small format paperback from the Stamp & Album Co. of America (1953). It did not take much time to transfer the stamps, though there would be plenty of empty spaces in this new beast of an album. Unlike my friend, I did not get a mint 1053 until 2001!

Childhood was a time to look forward to the holiday stamp catalogues such as the one depicted above from Gimbels. While our sons now tolerate their parents collecting, they were not much different as kids when the J.C. Penny Christmas Catalog arrived. If it came too early, my wife would hide it. Whether par-

ent or child, whether it is stamps or toys, these catalogs certainly brought out the lust of our eyes. But isn't that what being a kid (or a stamp collector) is all about?

Wish list: Rather than include my stamp wish list for you, I thought I would posit some ideas for the hobby and our club.

I wish for more kids to get involved with stamp collecting: A U.S. Dept. of Education study in 2003 among high school students identified the following: 41% can identify the three branches of government while 59% can list the "Three Stooges." 10% can name The Speaker of the House, while 64% can state

the latest winner of American Idol! There's more, and it is interesting. Well, frightening, actually.

Given the holes in our education system, is it any wonder that kids can't identify Canada on a North American map or think it is a trick question when asked to place WWI and WWII in chronological order?

Serious stamp collecting could easily plug the holes. But where do we start? Think in terms of our 2011 New Year's resolutions.

Let's all get to work with the youth both within and outside our families before it is too late. Get them off their introspective electronic gizmos and into stamp collecting. Is there still time?

Some specifics: • Hold a kid's stamp extravaganza. An organizer is needed, but club participation and contribution will follow if I know our club members. This could be a Saturday event in cooperation with teachers, the scouts, or another group. It's a start. Any ideas, folks?

• Staff a table at a teacher's conference. We have the

workers, giveaways, and club banner. Materials are already prepared and used with the library program. The sky is the limit. **Q:** What more do we need? **A:** Someone to make a contact.

Set up our club website. It doesn't have to be elaborate, but when a search is made, folks will find us and know what we are up to. Even at a minimum, the info such as that in our newsletters will be very informative. What's needed? A web master!
