Tidbits From a Recent Issue of Linn's

The 24 November 2014 issue of *Linn's Stamp News* contained several interesting items, some important and others just interesting...

•The Postal Regulatory Commission approved \$10M for a test project for USPS letter carriers to deliver groceries in San Francisco.

•The 1856 1¢ magenta British Guiana stamp that just realized \$9.5M at auction will be on loan to the U.S. Postal Museum for three years starting in April 2015.

•Three engraved stamps will be issued by USPS in 2015: Two for the annual wedding series, and another to promote the 2016 World Stamp Show in New York.

•Writer and expertizer, John Hotchner explains how col-

lectors can save expertizing fees by making a few critical observations of their material before submission.

•As a money saving option, USPS is looking into converting some of their trucking routes back to rail.

•Linn's tally for the 100 intentionally created upright \$2 Jenny Invert panes is now 20, leaving 80 still to be discovered.



•The American Topical Association is offering a free checklist of "turkeys on stamps" via its website.

•New Zealand Post customers can have their photos morphed into a dwarf from *The Hobbit* movies and appear on a personalized stamp.

•Jim Lee's article on the 1860s-1870s Bank Notes describes the many essays created and used to develop a patent for U.S. stamps that could not be reused.

•Because many new and experienced collectors report difficulties in detecting watermarks on their stamps, Janet Klug describes several ways to do this.

•USPS will be issuing a Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer design for computer-vended postage which will appeal to collectors of "deer on stamps."

•Collecting FDCs for the Batman sheet of 20 will be pricey for cachet makers and collectors with 12 stamps left over.

Holiday thematic collectors love this time of year, as modern postal history can be so much fun. Much of it is philatelic in origin, that is, collector and/or dealer inspired. So much the better. My wife is a members of the CPC (a.k.a. The Christmas Philatelic Club), and this organization tries to send out its dues notices in December from thematic locations as seen below.



Bethlehem, Kentucky ↑ was the CPC drop site in 2003, while Santa Claus, Indiana was used in 2007 and again in 2010. ↓



A well-known site for mailing cards is Christmas, FL. The cancel and cropped marking that follow are from my friend, John, in 1995. He lives in Casselberry, FL. To mail his cards, he drove 30 miles to Christmas, located due east of Orlando, about half way to the Atlantic.

Christmas collectors are aware of the storied history of Juanita Tucker the

long-time postmistress of Christmas, Florida. She worked with collectors, dealers, and cachet makers all across the U.S.



At Christmastime, she brought in additional help for extra shifts so that all the mail could be cancelled timely and appropriately. In 1930 she started a specialized tradition of a green Christmas tree holiday marking that continues today. The wording is "Glory to God in the highest, Chirstmas, Orange County, Florida." There has been some variation to the design of the tree over the years rendering them quite collectible.



There is an iconic holiday cancel in Austria in the town of *Christ-kindl*, meaning "Christ Child." It has been corrupted to Kris Kringle, and some use this term in referring to Santa Claus. Holiday covers with *Christkindl* can-

cels are sought after as are the Christmas-related American towns such as Bethlehem, Nazareth, North Pole, and others.

But there are specialized *Christ-kindl*-related covers and cancels that I would love to own. It started in 1961 as the *Austrian Special Balloon Flight* cover, and it continues today. Don Hammell of the Wisconsin Postal History Society collected these covers and exhibited a set of the first twenty-one years.

Each year there was a specialized Christkindl cancel on the current stamp and cover (some years it was an FDC) along with a specialized balloon post label. The label stated Weihnachts Ballonpost with a linear number which was "1" in 1961, the year of the first trip. Applied to the cover was an additional cancellike imprint in a variety of colors. This was sometimes tied to the label, and sometimes it was not. No surcharge or denomination is indicated. But there is a fee, as it has been noted that these flights support underprivileged children's education.

In year three ('61) flight data was added, a rubber stamp with space for altitude, distance, pilot's name, signatures, and more. Distances ranged from 800 meters to >75 km. The destination towns varied by year.

Checking through my wife's Christmas collection, I could not find a *Christkindl* cancel, but there were some beautiful Austrian stamps which follow.

Austria claims the first Christmas stamp (1937), but some Canadians make the same claim because of their 1898 2¢ map stamp (#85-86). Quite a lot has been written about its history, usages, and varieties.



Below are two Austrian Christmas stamps. The top one (1948, #558) depicts the creators of the well known hymn, Silent Night.



Below is #1666 of 1994, and the vignette is the painting "Birth of Christ" by Anton Wollenek (1920-2009). Ed.
