

Bidding rules remain the same as previous auctions.

•The minimum bid is \$1.00.

•The minimum bidding increment is 50¢. •Each club member is limited to submitting 10

lots. •You may also donate items for the auction, and have the realization go to PSLC. The donated items are greatly appreciated and benefit all our club programs.


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Rook Review

The subtitle of this book is "Franco-American War Relations Viewed Trough Their Effects on the French Postal System, 1942-1944."

Every once in a while collectors come across a stamp that is difficult to identify. It seems to be a "French something," but it is hard to tell. Catalogs are not always that helpful.

Here is a book that is part catalog with black and white images of stamps, locals, overprints, censorships, and interesting covers. But it is the history of the time that puts these items into perspective and narrates the story. An Allied Military Government (AMG) was suitable for Germany when the time came, as they had no choice, but France was different. After all, weren't they our allies? Who would govern France for the rest of the war?

With the invasion of North Africa and then Southern France with its accompanying Allied and Military and Civil Governments, RF was in a precarious situation. Leadership and administration were needed. Yes, France was being liberated, but who would be in charge: The leftover Vichies, the Gaullists, the Allies, the Communists, and/or the other local officials? □


PSLC at Balpex

15 September was the first club trip to a Lancaster Barnstormers game. The weather was perfect. We had eighteen in attendance with club members, family, and friends including Bill Greiner and five past presidents. Attendees were Bill & Truyde Greiner, Joy & Dennis Bouchard, Dennis Shumaker, Bob Larson, Paul Petersen, Len Kasper and fam-

ily, Al & Twila Schaub, Lucy Eyster, Lou DiFelice, and Jim Ziogas. PSLC was given a shout out on the big screen, and the Barnstormer announcer pronounced "Philatelic" correctly!

The game started out a little precariously, as Maryland scored two runs in the first inning, but then when up to bat, Lancaster scored seven runs on seven hits, also in the first. In fact in that inning Jerry Owens made two hits at two times at bat, and he was five for five for the game! It was Lancaster's game to lose, but they stayed firm, eventually winning 9-5. In the late 1960s, the Viet Nam War was at its height, and like most American teenagers, I accepted the reality that if called to duty, I would serve and hope for a safe return. Then in 1968 my best friend, George Fischer, Jr. was killed in Viet Nam. He stepped on a landmine while on patrol, lost both his legs, and died a few days later on a hospital ship. George's death ended a very promising racing career. I was devastated, so I began to re-evaluate my service obligation options. Re-thinking the situation, I decided to join the U.S. Coast Guard and signed up at my local recruiter's office just before my 18th birthday; I never got to see a draft card with my name on it! The week after high school graduation I was on a plane for Coast Guard Boot Camp in Cape May, NJ. I earned a rating in diesel mechanics and was subsequently assigned to a 311 foot Coast Guard Cutter that was originally a WWII U.S. Navy seaplane tender. On that vessel, I graduated to the position of main boiler technician with control of all the potable water and steam power for the entire ship. Together with my 200+ shipmates we survived Hurricane Gerda in September of 1969. We were in the middle of the Atlantic Ocean

and could not escape the eye of the storm.

Later I was assigned to a lifeboat station in Sodus Point, NY, the USCGC Summerville of Rochester, NY, and I participated in several rescue missions. In June of 1975 I earned my honorable discharge as a 3rd Class Petty Officer. I considered my service in the USCG very rewarding & richly memorable.

The United States Coast Guard is one of the nation's seven uniformed armed services in peacetime and war. It is presently under the U.S. Department of Homeland Security. In time of war, however, it is transferred to the U.S. Department of the Navy. It was created as the U.S. Revenue Marine Service by Congress on 4 August 1790 at the request of the Secretary of State, Alexander Hamilton. This function was needed as the Navy had been disestablished in 1785. The USCG is the oldest continuous seagoing service in the U.S.

Initially the USCG was headed by Hamilton whose original purpose was as collector of customs duty in the nation's seaports. In the era of the 1860s and the Civil War, it was renamed the U.S. Revenue Cutter Service. On 28 January 1915 the modern Coast Guard was formed under the Department of the Treasury and given a wider grouping of responsibilities.

The U.S. Coast Guard has been involved in every war and major military exercise from 1790 to the Iraq and Afghanistan wars. There are presently 42K active men and women, 7.9K reservists, 30K auxiliaries, and 8K full-time civilian employees in today's Coast Guard. In terms of size the U.S.C.G. is the 12th largest seagoing naval force in the world.



On 4 August 2015 the Coast Guard celebrated its 225th Anniversary, and USPS issued a "Forever" stamp to commemorate this milestone.

On this stamp are two important icons of the USCG, the *USCGC Eagle* and a MH-65 Dolphin helicopter.

The Eagle was built in 1936 along with five identical sister ships in Hamburg, Germany, christened the Horst Wessel. After the war it became a designated training ship for the USCG. In 1946 a USCG crew with the German crew on board sailed the ship across the Atlantic to New London, CT where it has been used at the USCG Academy for the education of the officer candidates. They honed their skills in seamanship, navigation, and leadership on this three-masted square rigger sailing ship which can do 17 knots at full wind. In 2005 the Eagle made its first return to Germany at Bremerhaven to great applause and acclaim.

The MH-65 Dolphin helicopter is the latest in a three decade evolution of choppers. One hundred and two were built at \$9M each, and they are used for homeland security details, drug interdiction, and search and rescue. *Len*





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
