The 1861 PM Provisionals of Madison, FL Presented by Trish Kaufmann

It was Trish's Kaufmann's definitive research on the 3-cent 1861 Postmaster Provisionals, published jointly in both the 1984 2000 American Philatelist and The Confederate Philatelist, that resulted in an entirely new Confederate section in the 2000 Scott Specialized Catalogue, as well as the CSA catalog. Her research on the Madison

provisionals was a 16year project, which ultimately disproved the misconceptions of over a century of prior catalog listings - both U.S. and Confederate. Her 2000 article, dedicated solely to the Madison C.H., Florida,

3-cent postmaster provisionals was a watershed moment for Confederate philately. This program will trace her efforts from 1984, when the Madison provisionals were not accepted as genuine by the philatelic community, to their ultimate acceptance in 2000. The only recorded use of a 3-cent 1861 Mad-





ison provisional was sold at auction this year for \$118,000. Many at PSLC know of Trish Kaufmann and her expertise in CSA philately from her presentation to PSLC in Lancaster and through her international reputation and service to the hobby. Her awards are legion.

Favor Cancels Part-II: Have some fun; make your own

Last month I wrote about the basics of **favor cancels** including their origins and how and where they are commonly used. This month I want to discuss some of the favor cancels I have requested and the fun I had with them. I am hoping that you may try the same and compile many keepsakes and souvenirs.

One variety of favor cancel commemorates people, places, or events. The importance is on the slogan's content in the cancel (See squirrel to the right). There may be a corresponding cachet. The date is of less importance.

In another favor cancel variety, the date stamp is of great importance. These validate the date/time of an event (see eclipse below) or the anniversary of an event. It has as much importance as the event, person, or place.

It is easy to find the availabil-


ity of these cancels through the regular "Postmark Pursuit" listing in *Linn's Stamp News*. For example, in the 4 September issue at the time of the eclipse, about 75 post offices are listed as offering a 21 August date-time cancel, many with a total eclipse image. Most of these POs were in the swath of totality during the transcontinental event. Many have been granted 30+ day extensions. If you would like a date strike on the specially created thermographic eclipse stamp, these cancels may still be available.



While the eclipse was not as sexy in Lancaster, weighing in at a whopping 78% of totality, it was still a major eclipse that everyone could view. It was worth a commemoration, especially with a specialty eclipse stamp by the USPOD. The image above contains a locally made cachet on a PPC of an Amish barn raising with a 21 August '17 favor cancel

from the Lancaster PO.

Through *Linn's* I learned about a special cancel featuring an albino squirrel living in Olney, IL. Since we had a regular customer on our patio, a white (non-albino) squirrel that my wife named **Buddy**, I sent a picture of him along with my request for a cancel. It was returned with a personal note from the PM and a few extra goodies. The cropped cancel is below (\$\du\$).



In 1978 I spent some time with the First Medical Battalion of the Third Marine Division at Camp Pendleton, CA. Through *Linn's*, I learned of an available favor cancel from this camp celebrating the 230th anniversary of the USMC in 2005. (See cropped cancel \$\psi\$)



I have also had some fun with favor cancels for special dates. When my cousin's son was married a few years ago in Latrobe, PA, I was out early and located the post office. That afternoon I got the date cancel on a card to my cousin for that night's party that is formerly known as the rehearsal dinner. And since it was an afternoon wedding the next day, I was able to get a wedding date cancel on a wedding stamp on my card to the bride & groom. These were treasured keepsakes.

And in another USMC related cancel, my story goes back to 12 June 1967, Day-1 for me in the 'Green Machine.' Here a drill instructor told the platoon, in no uncertain terms, that we would remember 12 June 1967 for the rest of our lives. Perhaps if he hadn't said it quite like that, I might not have remembered it (every year!), but he did say it, and he was right! Maybe it was the blood shooting out his eyes. Nevertheless, he made his point. So every year on 12 June, a slight chill goes up my spine. And fifty (50) years later, the Bausman, PA USPOD cooperated with me and

applied hand-back favor cancels of 12 June 2017 to PPCs that I sent my Marine friends who probably underwent similar experiences. Let's help them to remember their pleasant moments too.

2016 was a leap year, so I created a few PPCs and covers for this 29 February hand-back cancel.

On 11 April 2016, Bausman cancelled some postcards to which I attached computer-generated cachets. These indicated that this was the first effective date of the first 1st class postage decrease $(49\phi \rightarrow 47\phi)$ since 1 July 1919. In WWI first class rates were raised a penny (covers and postcards) on 2 November 1917 to help support the war. After Versailles, the rate was reduced back to what it had been before the war. Some collectors enjoy first days and last days of an effective postal rate, so 11 April 2016 is just another permutation of the above rate change commemorations. The official date of the reduction, 10 April 2016 was a Sunday, so cancelling did not begin until Monday, the 11th. And perhaps if I had contacts, a postal friend could have gone to work and cancelled it for me that Sunday the 10^{th} (\downarrow).



Rate decreases are very uncommon. Without the explanation in the label/cachet, very few would realize the significance of the cancellation date.

A much sought after favor cancel date is 25 December. The history is interesting as reported in her article in *Yule Log* (Christmas Philatelic Club) article (pg.-9 Vol. 49, No. 3), Christine Sanders stated that Christmas was not a federal holiday until 1870, and many functions were performed on Christmas before this date. It was a busy mailing day. Christmas cancels from 1792 are available.

Ms. Sanders notes that a good source for 25 December cancels is the U.S. Navy where the larger ships have post offices with active duty postal clerks. These and others on U.S. military bases may be happy to apply a Christmas day postmark for collectors. Ed. ⊠

It has been a busy several months. On 21 September Lancaster and Reading toured the Nat'l Postal Museum and were invited to the 14th Sundman Lecture by James Barron on his book, The One-Cent Magenta. (Details and snaps will appear in November.)



Dick Colberg recently published a catalog: WWII Patriotic Labels, eighty-two pages of color illustrations. This augmented his four 2017 articles for the Canadian Philatelic iournal L' Ècho on the following: Cancels of the Canadian Railroad Post Office, Plate numbers on Victorian Great Britain stamps, Security overprints on GB stamps, and U.S. revenue stamps.

Since making another find, Dr. Charles DiComo continues working to update his database on the extremely rare Waterbury roulettes on the 3-cent 1851-1857. Only thirteen of this rarity are known, and recently two of his were awarded Philatelic Foundation certifi- pictured are Dennis Shumaker, cates of authenticity.

In September Mike Marino was hired by the Cordier Auctions and Appraisal Company of Harrisburg to assist them in valuating stamp collections that they acquire for auction. He notes that a lot of philatelic material is surfacing, and many heirs have little idea of what to do with it other than turn it over to an auction company.

Continuing with his studies of the Overrun Countries, Hal Klein made a significant find of the Belgian variety, resulting in a new section in Keith Litchman's The Overrun Countries: Book 6, Belgium and its Varieties. Hal will be discussing this series at the PSLC Silcox, and James Savage. meeting in February.

Musings: October is National Stamp Collecting Month

Month, that is. It's every October! And with this lapse of the little grey cells, promotional opportunities for PSLC and the stamp hobby went down into the depth of the philatelic black hole...again! It wasn't until I saw the September edition of The American Philatelist and APS President Mick Zais's column on the topic (pgs. 820-821), that I realized that we missed the boat. He made many good suggestions for clubs to meet their outreach challenges. Ordinarily this would not have affected me so strongly, but it took me back to a stamp club report I recently read in the July/August 2017 issue of The Stamp Insider. This is the online publication of the NY Federation of Stamp Clubs of which PSLC is a relatively new member (see: stampinsider.org). The Fort Stanwix Stamp Club of Rome, NY closed its doors on 22 June due to "low membership, poor attendance, health problems, and old age (Pg.-67)." SI's editor then added a footnote to this club's page noting that in the last few years, eight other NY Federation stamp clubs have closed down.

Having reached 100 members last month at PSLC, with prospects of two more this month, it is easy to get complacent; won't PSLC go on forever? I am sure that members of these now retired NY clubs said the same thing a few years ago.

The key for PSLC is to not get into critical danger of disbanding. As a club, we must be proactive, and this means that we have a club that works hard. We must keep the members we have and make every effort to reach out to the community to educate the citizenry and bring some of them into our ranks.

Doing this will take some time and work, but it doesn't have to be a lot of either. An hour or two a month to work with Philately 101 will do wonders for the retention of our new collectors or those seeking to review. Then there is the secondary effect, that these members will reach out to others. The more one knows about the hobby, the more enjoyable and challenging it becomes. Many philosophers believe

In all honesty, I missed it. Nat'l Stamp Collecting that without a challenge, humans will wither on the vine. And given the caliber of PSLC membership, many desire the challenge. Challenges are what get us out of bed in the morning and keep us going during the day until we drop into our beds at night.

> Dr. Zais suggested many outreach activities for stamp clubs, and I'll highlight some below. APS and PSLC may be able to help with the resources for these. And which of these can PSLC implement in 2018...2019?

> The methods themselves fall into three categories: Setting up displays that will remain for a given period of time. ♦ Putting up posters, signs, meeting notices, and placing literature (i.e. *Linn's*, *AP*, club newsletters, and others). And ♦ Making presentations, telling stories, and teaching about stamps.

> The places include but are not limited to ♦Post Offices ♦doctor's and veterinarian's offices (i.e. dogs 'n cats on stamps), \$\forall \text{muse-}\$ ums, ♦art galleries, ♦flea markets, ♦schools, ♦local businesses (i.e. banks, grocery stores, markets), ♦libraries, ♦scouts, ♦retirement and nursing homes, \diamond elevators, \diamond hospitals, ♦ service organizations (i.e. Kiwanis, Rotary, Lions), and ♦ many others.

> How: The key is to mix and match the appropriate ♦ method with its ♦ place. You won't be doing a PowerPoint in an elevator but you may have permission to put up a poster or meeting notice. Save the displays and presentations for the school or library.

> Depending on the group, topical collecting may be a good approach such as animal stamps for the veterinary offices or country collections for civic groups such as the Rotarians. Many options exist. There are several ways to reach the community. But we need a plan; we need volunteers. We don't have to reach for the moon right now. Even if we do just one activi-

ty in '18 and perhaps two in '19, we can move the philatelic world by one event at a time.
