



CAN WE "PICK YOUR BRAIN" PLEASE?



much Since I had had so attending the ATA convention last summer in Falls Church, VA I decided to fly to Milwaukee, WI this summer for the annual convention which happened to be the 50th anniversary of that organization. I signed up for EVERYTHING they had planned which meant getting to Milwaukee the day before the formal start of the convention and staying a day later. (Idea: Maybe next year our "bus trip" should be to Buffalo for a weekend.)




YOUR CLUB NEEDS YOU!

At the November meeting we will be electing a new vice-president. (From the <u>Falls Philatelic Flyer</u> the following article was published by their editor. This may be of interest to some of our "soaking" members.)

As I was perusing publications this month, I came across the following item out of Linn's from Ken Reichard of California, who supplies us with the following ideas about removing holiday-season stamps that arrive on colored envelopes. First, separate all the stamps on colored paper, and ready them to be place in a halffull bowl of water. Float the stamps face down, but do not immerse the stamps in the water. Of his soaking experiences, Reichard said, "In most cases, the stamp will drop to the bottom of the pan without a sign of color."

He also has a technique for the obstinate stamps that remain partially attached to the paper and pick up some of the dye from the envelope paper: soak the stamps in milk. An overnight soaking will usually remove the unwanted color. "On some stamps, a second fresh-milk bath may be necessary." Reichard says. He also cautions, "Be very careful in handling the stamp when washing out the milk."
