
AUGUST PICNIC REPORT

WHY DO WE COLLECT?

(Here are some excerpts from an article in the Global Stamp News by Barry Krausse that may interest you)

Why do we collect?

(1) A sense of order. In a busy life where things don't always work out the way we want them to, collecting stamps or coins or medals, etc., gives us a sense of order, a certain amount of control over our day, a feeling of pride and accomplishment when we finally complete an album or display case with "all" or what is obtainable of some series of collectibles.

We can't control the 6:00 news, the weather, the stock market, or even the behavior of friends and family, but we can arrange our chess pieces, or stamps, or coins, etc. and study them and learn from their beauty and history.

(2) Knowledge. It is great to know a lot about our job or schoolwork, about our city and country, about our cars or pets. But often we yearn for the distraction and satisfaction of a type of esthetic knowledge that comes from collecting.

The first collections were probably sea shells or pretty stones picked up by stone age wanderers, curious about the reflection in the river water or fascinated with the shape of some natural object.

There is no way to predict where the hunt for knowledge will end. Maybe your interest in coins will lead to medals which in turn lead to a collection of foreign paper money or silver bullion art bars. Ignorance may be bliss, but knowledge is power. And besides, it's fun to know about things!

(3) Investment. How many things that you buy will be worth more than you paid for them in ten years? Collections can increase in value time passes or at least maintain some salvage cash worth, which is more than you can say for dollars spent on movies, travel or food.

It is hard to find a collection that is worth **nothing** after the passage of time and it is surprising how many things increase in value, at varying rates of course, as the calendars flip by.

- (4) Fellowship. Not all collectors make new friends and acquaintances as a result of their hobby, but many do. Conventions, collectible shows, and exhibitions are places where friendly business contacts may be acquired. Collector magazines and journals introduce you to other people who have similar collecting interests.
- (5) Entertainment. Collecting is fun and quite entertaining when you are methodically acquiring nice items for your shelves or safe deposit box. Boredom, anger, confusion, frustration, and laziness are mental states that are successfully combated by collecting.

It is an unusual collector who is bored when looking at needed items for the collection. If you aren't making fast progress with other aspects of your life, why not get out the thimbles or art prints or first-day covers or antique weapons or old books and relive the entertaining moments that you experienced when you were first bitten by the collecting bug?

Because a collection is something that you can own and visit any time that you want, when you spend money on collectibles you are buying a chance at being entertaining forever. When you purchase an airplane boarding pass or a stage play ticket or a drink at a cocktail lounge, you are entertained once.

(6) Exhibiting. Every collection can be exhibited, if not at a formal competitive display in a convention of collectors, then maybe as a permanent or temporary exhibit in a school, library, church or club. If you work in an organization which has space for displaying collections, get permission to exhibit some of your treasures.

(7) Recognition. Fame is a fleeting pleasure, but every collector gets deep respect when he or she is admired and acclaimed for some outstanding collection. Ribbons, trophies, and other awards sweeten the effort made in building up a respectable collection of interesting items. Who knows: maybe the collection of pictures or baseball cards, etc., will lead to another collection.

It is possible to complete a collection in the sense that you acquire all available major varieties of some collectible, within your budget and time limitations. But you will never outgrow the urge to collect, if you are a true and confirmed collector!
