#### **EDITOR'S NOTES**

#### MINUTES, APRIL 14, 2004, LCPS MEETING

The meeting started at 7 P.M. on Wednesday, April 14, 2004. Thirty-three members were present as President Marilyn Shirley introduced our special guest and speaker for the evening, Executive Director of the American Philatelic Society, Robert Lamb.

Bob updated us on the APS, its membership and services. Membership, now about 48,000, is declining by about 1000 a year. The median age of APS members is 58. An ad agency has been hired to devise ways to increase membership in the APS.

APS services are doing well. Stamp sales are working from a \$9,000,000 inventory, and internet sales, which have a \$4,000,000 inventory, are increasing. Expertizing is a busy area, and Stamp Shows are doing well. The APS Library has two miles of book shelves and is increasing its quantity of philatelic literature at the rate of one mile every 10 years.

The increasing pace of the APS services has resulted in a real need for more office space. After much discussion the decision was made to purchase a match factory in Bellefonte, PA, which has 100,000 sq. ft. of space. Half the space will be (or is now) rented out and become a source of income for APS. The remaining half of the building will be used by the APS—with the current building in State College being sold. The APS has had a wonderful reception from community leaders in Bellfonte. (Continued on p. 4)



Saturday, June 26, 2004, is the dedication of the new facility. We will offer visitors a tour of the building and a formal dedication ceremony in the afternoon. Dinner in the evening is \$100 a person. All stamp collectors are invited to the ceremony and associated activities.

In the question and answer period following Bob Lamb's talk, he noted that collectors are becoming more specialized due to the quantity and cost of stamps. The APS is against personalized stamps because they consider them a money-generating gimmick. Thanks to a change in personnel at the USPS, relations between the USPS and the stamp collecting community has improved sharply in recent years. There is no active program for junior members at the APS.

Treasurer Don Weber reported a balance in the checking account of \$2675.49. Chuck Kilgore advises that 33 people have signed up for the Washington, DC, trip on Saturday, June 12—but at least five more are needed to fill the bus. Bob Noble and Woody Hahn will co-chair a display at the Senior Expo at the Lititz Community Center on Wednesday, May 19 from 9 a.m.-2 p.m.

This month's drawing would have been worth \$10 to Harry Ibaugh had he been at the meeting! So, \$15 will be the prize at the May meeting. There was time at the end of the meeting for hunting through penny stamps and socializing. Meeting adjourned by 9 p.m.
