MINUTES, MAY 12, 2004, LCPA METING

Marilyn Shirley called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. on Wednesday, May 12. There were 30 members and one guest present. Our guest was Roy Baardsen, vice president of the Reading Stamp Club. He had attended our stamp show and was invited to attend a meeting of our club. He was impressed by the number of members present and the enthusiasm of the members for their hobby. Roy invited us to attend the Reading Stamp Club Show on Saturday, September 11, 2004 at the Farmer's Market in Leesport. There will be 15 dealers there.

Three get well cards were circulated for Mark King, Truyde Greiner, and Don Weber. Chuck Kilgore reported that 39 people have signed up for the Washington, DC, bus trip on Saturday, June 12. There is still time to sign up for the trip. Cost is \$20. Alistair Welch won the drawing, which was \$15 this week.

An invitation was extended by Bob and Barbara Brown (dealers at our stamp show) to visit their home in Pottstown where they have reassembled the old Lititz Post Office in their basement. To make arrangements call Brown's Postal Museum at (610) 469-2758.

The APS is having an open house at their new headquarters in the Match Factory in Bellefonte, PA, on Saturday, June 26. Carpooling has been suggested and a paper was circulated for interested persons to sign. If you are interested, contact Marilyn Shirley.

We were made aware of a pilot program called Stamp Camp USA for kids to learn through stamps. More information as it becomes available.

After a short break Leslie Botte lead a discussion on watermarks. Watermarks are impressions put into paper during its manufacture. Watermarks are most commonly detected by placing a stamp face down into a black tray containing watermark identification fluid (or Ronsonal). Foreign stamps can have inverted and/or sideways watermarks. The last watermarks on US stamps were on the 1938 presidential series.

To demonstrate tagging which is caused by a fluorescent coating on paper Leslie used a short wave UV lamp in the darkened kitchen area of our meeting room. Tagging has been used since the 1960s on higher value US stamps for recognition by the USPS automatic canceling machines. Low value US and bulk mail stamps are not tagged. Tagging chemicals are not removed by water. Many foreign stamps' tagging can be seen using a long wave UV lamp.

The June meeting will be on penny stamps. An auction is scheduled for the July meeting. In August there will be a picnic at Marilyn's home. The meeting adjourned at 9:00 p.m.


