THE NATIONAL STAMP MUSUEM VISIT

Thirty-nine people participating in this club trip. From the notes provided, everyone enjoyed the Postal Museum, especially the featured exhibit, "The Queen's Own: Stamps That Changed the World", which included many items from Queen Elizabeth's personal philatelic collection. The collection included essays (proposed designs) of the "penny black" that were considered and other stamps and plate printings from the world's first postage stamps from 1839 and 1840. It also included the "Mulready's" that were the first proposed postal lettersheets. These had ornate designs with Britainia and other figures representing Britain, but lettersheets were despised by the stationary manufacturers who launched a press campaign to eliminate them.

A few of us took a formal tour with a docent whose explanations made the exhibits come alive and were very informative. We were introduced to the Albany postal mascot, "Owney", both the stuffed original and a bronze statue. We were invited to rub its nose for good luck. We also learned that duck stamps are used to support conservation efforts, and about the development of free postal delivery. The museum houses railroad cars, now obsolete, that were used for sorting and delivery, and three airplanes and trucks.

The tour lasted about 45 minutes. Following the tour, many elected to visit other attractions in the city. The most popular spot was the new World War II Memorial and other nearby museums and galleries. The perfect weather added to our enjoyment of the day.




