The next meeting will be held at 7:30 p.m., 8 September, at the Maple Grove Community Center. The Newsletter will not be published in September.


The Reading Stamp Show, at the Leesport Auction Pavilion, Rt. #61, is scheduled for 11 September. For details, call 610-779-0175.


The cover will be put with other items from the Lancaster Stamp Club, and will be saved by Lancaster County Philatelic Society.

FIRST DAY CEREMONY, JUNE 30

This summer's special philatelic adventure (in addition to the bus trip June 12 to Washington, DC) was spent at Baltimore's Inner Harbor for the first day ceremony on June 30 for the USS Constellation stamp. I got there before the ceremony in order to take a tour of the USS Constellation, the last all sail warship built by the US Navy,. The stamp commemorates the 150th anniversary of the ship's launching on August 26, 1854. The ship saw varied duty over its 150 years, including preventing slave ships from leaving Africa and, during World War II, as flagship of the US Atlantic fleet from January to June 1942. After being condemned by the Navy as unsafe in 1994, restoration began in 1996; in 1999, restored to her original 1854 appearance, the Constellation took her permanent home in Baltimore harbor.

The ceremony participants included USS Constellation Museum Chairman, the Museum's executive director, three USPS representatives, Congressman Dutch Ruppersberger, and the Mayor of Baltimore, Martin O'Malley.

After checking out stores at Inner Harbor and eating a crab cake at Phillips I rescued my car from the parking garage (for \$16!) and returned home.
