EDITOR'S NOTES

THE BEST & WORST CONTEST—Each year Linn's magazine asks its subscribers to select the best and worst design among the stamps issued by the US Postal Service during the preceding year. We are going to use the Linn's "best & worst" stamp selection as a contest among the members of our club—a contest with a payoff for the winner! The process begins during the January meeting and will conclude in the March or April meeting.

Here's what you have to do:

- 1. At the January meeting visit the display which has pictures of all US stamps issued by the USPS during 2004. Study and review the stamps carefully.
- 2. As you review the pictures of the stamps, you will discover that the stamps fall into three different categories, as follows:


Commemorative Stamps—number 1 through 22

Definitive & Special stamps—number 23 through 32

Postal Stationery—number 33 through 38

- 3. After you have reviewed the three categories of stamps on display, select the stamps in each of the three categories that you believe have the best and worst designs.
- 4. Enter your selection on the ballot, and sign your name. When *Linn's* announces the results of the nationwide contest, the club member whose entries comes closest to the nationwide survey will be awarded prizes. Prize money of \$30 will be shared among the winners.






Acoma pot

NPM REVENUE STAMPS -- For the past several months, American stamp collectors have debated the decision of the National Postal Museum to destroy some 1.1 million 20th Century US revenue stamps held in the Museum's vault. Nearly every stamp collecting heavyweight had weighed in on the decision—but the NPM held fast to its decision. But on 17 December, in a sudden turnabout, NPM officials announced that it would not destroy of the stamps. Instead, the stamps will be marked and sold at a later date.

The move was widely applauded by collectors. But controversy remains—over how the stamps will be marked and over what to do with the roughly 6 million revenue stamps still held in NPM vaults.

WHITE HOUSE CHRISTMAS CARD The 2004 White House Christmas card, printed by Hallmark, featured a picture of the fireplace in the White House red room. The unusual feature of the card, however, was that it featured a verse from the Bible (Psalm 95.2). Although the two million cards carried the postmark of the Crawford, TX, Post Office, they were processed by the Austin, TX, Processing and Delivery Center. The cost of the cards and the .37 cent postage was paid by the Republican National Committee.
