New Postal Service Guide—The 2005 edition of The Postal Service Guide to U. S. Stamps is now available. The 5 x 9 inch format of past years has undergone a significant and welcome revision: The new edition comes in an 8 x 10.5 inch format with pages held together by a red plastic comb binder. As a result, the book will lie flat with the pages open! The size of the stamp illustrations remains unchanged at 70% of actual size, however, although recent issues appear at 77%. The new edition also includes an explanation of catalog values, reproduced from the 2005 Scotts Specialized Catalogue....

The 2005 edition can be obtained from most U. S. post offices, from the USPS Stamp Fulfillment Service (1-800-782-6724) for \$19.95, or from many bookstores for \$23.00.

New Linn's Stamp News Format—Linn's Stamp News also has a new format: the 11 x 15 inch size has been replaced by a similar but smaller format measuring 11.5 x 12 inches. Except for the change in size, the layout and text are similar to those features of the previous version. Linn's advises, however, that "the new shorter and narrower page means in general that news stories and the regular columns will be written shorter. The major headlines will [also] be of a smaller size...." As a long-time subscriber, I like the changes and hope they enable Linn's to hold the subscription price at its current rate of \$45.95 per year.

APS Executive Director Search—Robert E. Lamb, who graced one of our meetings last year, will retire in June 2006 from his position as Executive Director of the APS. Since his retirement was announced in November, the APS Board has been conducting a search for a new Executive Director. The head of the search committee is Wade Saadi, a new APS Board member who also runs an executive recruiting firm in New York.

The initial advertisement for the position listed "knowledge of philately/stamp collecting" at the very end of the job description. The location of this requirement, along with some heartburn about how the advertisement was approved, upset several APS board members. They succeeded in calling a special meeting of the Board to review the process. After a contentious meeting early in December, the concerns were finally resolved: the "philately/stamp collecting" phrase moved higher in the Job Requirement and the responsibilities of the APS Board President were sorted out. Stay tuned to learn who is selected for this position--and of his or her knowledge of philately/stamp collecting!







New 2 cent stamp
