We'll look for all you to attend and have fun.


August was a Lucky Month

Halloween is a popular area of topical collecting

The holiday, Halloween, is a popular subject of collecting not only in stamps but also many other hobbies.

Halloween postcards, antique decorations and advertising art as well as many other specialties are actively pursued.

In the field of philately known as "Naval Covers" (covers cancelled on or in relationship to U. S. warships), many collectors would send envelopes to the mail clerks of Naval ships to be postmarked on Halloween.

Many of the Naval clerks would insert letters into three-bar cancels to create wording referring to the spooky holiday.

Other collectors create event covers such as the one above to have Halloween fun.

There is a controversy as to whether the popular hobby is Christian or pagan. However, All Saint's Day probably originated May 13th in the year 609. It was eventually moved to November 1st and October 31st became something like "All Hallow's Eve." A Hallow was a saint.

Many of the day's customs have interesting beginnings. For example it is claimed that people first dressed in costumes so vengeful spirits roaming the earth could not identify their targets. Philatelists roam the earth looking for new stamps!
