

# Carsonia Park: A Reflection of Reading Area's Past

It is a challenge to remember the past glory of the Reading Area even if you are a native-born senior citizen. If you moved here in the 1960's or so as your editor did, it is even more difficult. But there was a time when Camelot was found in Central Berks County. George Washington believed this area to be the most important resource for The Revolution. The Reading Company was once the largest corporation in the world.

And outside New York, you could argue that the entertainment center of the country was found in downtown Reading, and spread several miles eastward. Carsonia Park was a part of that playground. It offered rides, a ten-plus acre lake and grand Crystal Ballroom, competing with busy vacation hotels, vaudeville stages and rich art venues.





In 1894, John A. Rigg and Robert N. Carson bought the Custard Bottom farm and additional acreage to open an amusement park along their trolley line. People paid to ride the Union Traction Company of Reading trolley and could stop off at Carsonia Park. Tickets to rides cost a nickel but entrance to the park was free. Supposedly an original ticket booth still stands at the corner of Freidensberg and Lewis Roads. The park was named in a Reading Eagle contest by S. Emma Moyer, a city school teacher.

A ten-and-a-quarter acre lake supported boating of all kinds. The boat repair buildings still stand. In 1960 the Reading Scuba Team found an anchor in the lake and it is now on display at the Lower Alsace Township Building. For a quarter, visitors could use the 900,000 gallon sand-bottom pool all day. Woolen swimsuits could be rented!

A beer garden built in 1936 is now part of the Anthony's Trottoria Restaurant at Navella and Byram Streets. The lamp posts in the parking lot once lined the midway and can be seen in many postcards. People of note bought homes in the nearby area. A seasonal homeowner was Lillian Gish, an early Hollywood superstar who bought 104 Midland Avenue. The Crystal Ballroom Dance Palace hosted top dance bands: Benny Goodman, Cab Calloway, Sammy Kay, Guy Lombardo and others. The park ran from 1896 to 1950 but the ballroom lasted to 1968 when it was burned to the ground, allegedly by men earlier denied entrance to the building.


