

ROMAN MAIL FOUND IN ENGLAND

A recent find of about 700 letters written during the Roman occupation of Britain during the first century had received considerable attention in Great Britain, according to an account in the November-December issue of "The Philatelist and PJGB adapted from an article by Philip Howard in The Times of London.

The 1,800-year-old letters were unearthed at what was the Roman military outpost of Vindolanda just south of Hardian's Wall and is today Chesterhold in Northumberland. Although located near the very edge of the Roman Empire, Vindolanda had all the amenities of its age, including central heating, baths, flush toilets and a hotel to accommodate visitors.

Inscribed on thin shakes of wood, the letters were written by at least 600 individuals, mainly ordinary soldiers among the non-Italian cavalry from the Rhine and Northern Gaul that garrisoned the small fort.

The letters give details of the lives of ordinary soldiers during the occupation, including the organization of the Roman army, detail of this dress, his food and the events of the period. Letters of introduction, recommendation and requests for military leave are among the items identified.

According to the report, the wooden tablets have been dated between 95 - 195 A.D., presumably by radiocarbon analysis. The wood was fortuitously preserved in a wet rubbish dump on the site.

Most of the letters are said to be quite personal, including some with contents that any soldier who served far from home would readily recognize.

One that accompanied or preceded a parcel reads, "I have sent you pairs of socks from Sattua, two pairs of sandals and two pairs of underpants."

In a different vein, another letter is a birthday party invitation between two Roman ladies, Flavia Severa and Lepedina.

According to the published account, "When the excavations are complete, it is planned that the complete archives will be housed in the British Library. Collectors can breathe again -- nothing will be for sale."

LANCOPEX IN REVIEW

The LCPS and invited dealers of LANCOPEX '91 certainly were not singing "Rain, Rain Go Away, Come Again Another Day" at the recently concluded stamp show. The Park City Mall lots were filled to capacity and LANCOPEX '91 benefitted as droves of shoppers came through, browsing and buying at the 14 dealers' tables, standing two deep at the more interesting display of wares. All the dealers reported higher than anticipated sales and being well pleased with the two-day show.

The official cachet prepared for the show was a bonanza for the LCPS. At \$1.25 per envelope, the club realized \$900. Aditionally, T shirts remaining from last year's show moved briskly. A highlight of the show was the voting by the public for Best of Show. The honor went to Gordon Miller for his frames depicting "Stamps of the Azores 1868-1931. Besides Lancaster, exhibits were entered by collectors from York, Lebanon and Philadelphia areas. The stamp exhibits, virtually ignored at the larger shows, received their fair share of attention as exhibits in Junior, Club and National categories vied for the attention of the seasoned collectors and casual passersby.

The success of the show can be attributed to the experience, preparation and long hours of hard work by the LCPS members who participated, coupled with a fortuitous run of stormy weather that presented us with a grand opportunity to "strut our stuff" before successive waves of shoppers who came in out of the rain.

EXHIBITOR AWARDS LANCOPEX '91

LANCOPEX '91, the Sixth Annual Stamp Show And Exhibition of the Lancaster County Philatelic Society was held April 20 & 21, 1991 at Park City Center, Lancaster, PA.

The 512-page Stamp Exhibit featured 19 Exhibitors. Awards were as follows:

The Grand Prize and a Gold was awarded to Steven M. Roth for his exhibit "Philadelphia Postal History." His exhibit also won the APS and the Postal History Society awards.

The Reserve Grand and a Gold went to John C. Hufnagel for the exhibit "The Kansas-Nebraska Overprints." This exhibit also won the BIA Award.

The LCPS, Keystone and PA. Postal History Awards and a Gold was awarded to James G. Boyles for the exhibit "Postal History of Lancaster County, PA 1798-1899."

The Novice Award and a Silver went to John E. Romig for his exhibit "Stampless Covers 1800-1847."

A.A.P.E. Awards were given to John Hufnagel for the exhibit "U.S. Stamps with Plate Numbers" and Gorden A. Miller for his exhibit "Stamps of the Azores 1868-1931." Both of these exhibits won Silver awards.
