





COMIC STRIP STAMPS


The United States Postal Service unveiled the designs of the 32 cent Comic Strip Classics stamps May 4. This was one day before the 100th anniversary of the first comic strip, Down Hogan's Alley.


Issue date is October 1, and the pane will consist of 20 se-tenant designs. The stamps will kick off National Stamp Collecting Month, an annual Postal Service promotion since 1982.

The Comic Strip Classics stamps will be the third installment in the Postal Service's Classic Collection. The first two issues are the Legends of the West and the Civil War stamps.

The Comic Strip Classic stamps will honor comic strips created within the first 50 years of comics, (1895-1945).

A DISCUSSION OF STAMP HINGES PAST AND PRESENT.

A common complaint, not just amongst stamp collectors, but with all shoppers is the high price and poor quality of everything we buy. A case in point is trying to find a good stamp hinge now-a-days. We print the following summary of an article published in Linn's Stamp News, April 29, 1991. The article written by Michael Schrieber, discusses hinges past and present.

According to the article, it seems that any hinge presently manufactured in the USA, is being made by Harold Cohn & Company, of Chicago, Illinois, regardless of the brand name under which it is sold.

As various companies have gone out of business, including Dennison, Fold-O-Hinge, and Tennyson, Harold Cohn & Company has purchased their equipment, patents and rights to their brand names. He presently also makes wholesale hinges for Scott and his own brand, Harco.

Although Harold Cohn & Company makes Dennison hinges for the Dennison Company of Canada, these hinges are not the same green type Dennison used to manufacture because green glassine paper is no longer being made, being available only in white today. Oh, well, so much for the idea of obtaining my favorite green Dennison hinges from Canada!!

The article pointed out that over the past two to three years certain white glassine hinges under various brand names have been defective in that they would not peel off stamps, instead they tended to thin used stamps. The company spokesman says this problem was due to a defective batch of glassine and has been remedied. However, since there will still be some packages of these defective hinges remaining in wholesalers and dealers stocks, it may be wise to test hinges from any newly opened packages before extensive use.

The LCPS Stamp Show planners believe in starting early. They are requesting that members give thought to a theme for next year's LANCOPEX, preferably some anniversary that can be tied into the show.
