# Many Pennsylvania Post Offices have Indian Names

Cities, towns, counties, geographical features, etc., are named by many methods.

Dr. George P. Donehoo, an early 1920's authority on the subject wrote: "No state in the entire nation is richer in Indian names or Indian history than Pennsylvania."

Steve Kochersperger, a Julian, PA, Postmaster, collected the names of our state's post offices that are believed to have Native American origins. He used numerous sources, including Dr. Donehoo's 1928 book on the subject as well as other books and internet sources.

He published a list in the February 2007 edition of the Pennsylvania Postal Historian.

The accuracy of these attributions runs from rock-solid to dubious, but that is the fun of historical research—it is just as exciting as uncovering how a rare stamp variety was created or unraveling a curious postal rate.

An example is your editor's home city of Altoona. There are competing theories, one is that the city's name is derived from the Cherokee word *alatoona*. I know from living there that it was borrowed from the name of a town (in Georgia, I believe) that was in the range of that tribe. Another thought is that the German city of Altona was the source of the name. Again, having lived in Altoona there was a fair number of German settlers (including my ancestors) but I would say the predominant ethnic group was Scots-Irish.

This is an example how sticky this research can be. However, in many cases it is much clearer.

For example, the Lenape word *machk* means "bear." Thus, Maxatawny is derived from *machk-sit-hanne* which means "the stream where bears made a footpath."

Macungie, nearby in Lehigh County came from *machk-kawunshi*, "the feeding place of bears. Before Jim Thorpe became Jim Thorpe in 1954, it was Mauch Chunk, from *machk-wachung* or "the hill where bears sleep."

Conestoga, in Lehigh County, was named for the Susquehanna Indians there—kanestoge or "people of the immersed pole." (Perhaps this was a reference to their stockade towns?). Oley, it is believed, derived it's name from olink," which has be translated to mean "a hole" or "a cove."

A small town in Luzerne County was named Wyoming from the Indian word *m'cheuwaming*" meaning "at the great flats. It is also the origin of the State of Wyoming. A corruption of *m'cheuwaming* may also be behind our local Wyomissing, but it is unclear according to the article in the Pennsylvania Postal Historian.

Lahaska in Bucks County is based on a Lenape word meaning "source of much writing" or "the place of the treaty." This is a possible reference to the 1683 "Walking Purchase Treaty." When the researcher for the above article asked the local Postmaster if he knew the origin, he replied "place with the handsome postmaster!"




