Mission Statement: "The purpose of The Penny Post is to present original research articles in the fields of United States Carriers, Local Posts, and Eastern Expresses. The Penny Post is the quarterly journal of the Carriers and Locals Society (C&LS). It has received 24 Gold Medals in Literature competition.



Carriers and Locals are stamps issued in conjunction with postal carrier services in the U.S. in the 1840s-1860s. There is a large section of the *Scott Catalogue* devoted to these stamps. The C&LS has been instrumental in confirming many of the *Scott* listings.

I became interested in the society in the 1990s when I was getting active in collecting the Baltimore Carrier Stamps.

Years later, after Jim Boyles died, I was asked to dispose of his voluminous collection. He had a whole Xerox paper box full of carriers and locals. I knew very little about these stamps beyond the Baltimore stamps. I consulted with the President of the society by phone and he volunteered to sort through the box and identify everything if I'd come to his home in Alexandria, VA. No contest! Most of Jim's items were reprints and some fakes. I would never have known without the help of this→

America's Largest Unknown Stamp Club!

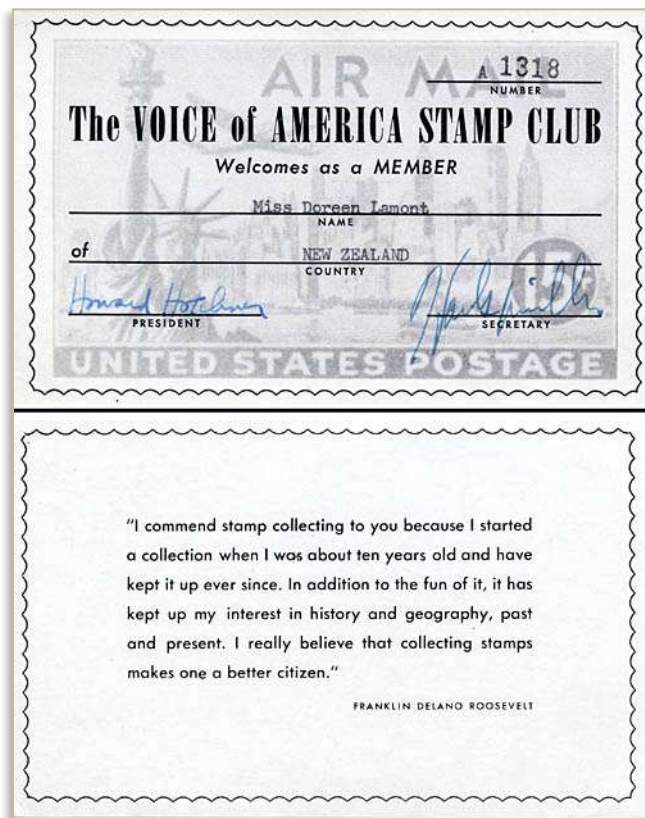
The Office of War Information¹ (O.W.I.) was formed at the beginning of World War II to provide citizens in foreign countries accurate, up-to-the-minute news and useful information about what was happening at the war fronts in their countries and elsewhere around-the-world.

President Franklin D. Roosevelt had known of the Reich Minister for Public Enlightenment and Propaganda Paul Joseph Goebbels' success within the Nazi Party. Goebbels was a master of Fascist radio, print and film propaganda...he had engineered the rise of Hitler and the Nazi party to power. Goebbels was creating a propaganda machine designed to get gain a foothold in the "minds" of the peoples of unoccupied Europe, North, South and Central America, Africa and Asia.

The Nazi's wanted to shape minds around the world. FDR need only point Members of Congress and the Senate in the direction of the "German American Bund" and "Deutscher Bund Canada" to make his point of the traction the movements were gaining on North America soil. Of course, then as now, the House and the Senate moved at their normal pace. So, the O.W.I. was launched by Executive Order on June 13, 1942 to mount a large-scale information and propaganda operation in Europe and around the world to combat the worldwide Fascist threat.

The O.W.I. was abolished in April, 1945 by Executive Order of the new President Harry Truman, however the radio broadcast unit established by F.D.R. under the O.W.I. for international broadcasting overseas, the "Voice of America", would continue under the original V.O.A. charter, "to broadcast accurate, balanced, and comprehensive news and information to an international audience."

In 1952, Howard Hotchner (father of the philatelic writer John Hotchner) and Bill Miller², "...developed a promotional idea...they created the "Voice of America Stamp Club", and which, "...ultimately numbered many hundreds of thousands of registered members around the world. Who knows how many millions of listeners could not, or dared not; write to the Voice of America."²



If you have never heard of the Voice of America Stamp Club it's because under United States law, the Voice of America was, and still is, prohibited from broadcasting within the United States. Howard Hotchner functioned as V.O.A. stamp club president, while Bill Miller was the writer and the "voice" of the V.O.A. Stamp Club's weekly stamp program. Bill focused on the stories behind U. S. stamps, especially new issues and how they reflected positively on American history and our society."

These covers are not expensive. However, for obvious reasons they are extremely scarce in the U.S. The value is in its postal history and what it represents.
