You'll receive a Instructions: numbered paddle when you arrive. Place this number on all your items to be auctioned, and use this paddle during the auction when you are bidding. This will insure that what you buy and what you sell are accurately credited and debited. sure that all your lots are accompanied by an accurate and detailed description, as this helps buyers to better understand what they are looking at. Auction lot description forms have already been emailed, and hard copies will be available. You may also access this on the website at any time. Fiscal transactions will only be made after the last lot has been sold.



The Auction Committee recommends that you: Bring cash to pay for the items you win, and Keep a running total during the

auction of the items and prices of

the lots you sell and win. Finally, please attach your sales information securely to the lots you are entering into the auction. This will help avoid any misidentification with other sellers' lots.

Bidding Rules: Minimum bids are \$1.00 per lot. The minimum bidding increment is 50¢. Only dues-paying members may participate in the auction. Auction participants are limited to ten (10) lots. You may also donate items to the club with the realizations going to the benefit of the PSLC. Donations are always appreciated.

The Society of Paper Money Collectors (SPMC)

Dr. DiComo

Ed's Note: This is the next in the series of highlighted societies. As Dr. DiComo notes, "Many PSLC members collect coins, so 'money' is in their sights."

In brief, the SPMC promotes the study and appreciation of paper money and related financial history. As a non-profit organization, the SPMC provides grants for research, publishes a bi-monthly journal *Paper Money*, sponsors exhibits and lectures at regional and national venues, and supports education and outreach to the greater numismatic community. Anyone interested in paper money of the United States and related topics should consider joining.



The SPMC has a user-friendly website¹, where all 50+ years' worth of past issues of the Society's journal, *Paper Money*, are available and searchable online. This journal is published six times per year on high quality glossy paper. The Society also allows members to borrow up to six books and other items from the Library for a period of six weeks – they have an extensive selection of titles and authors.

Furthermore, the SPMC offers research grants to support research projects leading to publications of the following types:

-Journal articles, appearing either in *Paper Money* or other publications approved by the SPMC Board of Governors.

-Books and monographs.

-Master's theses and doctoral dissertations pursued at academic institutions approved by the SPMC Board of Governors.

Matching funds for projects approved by other organizations whose missions are congruent with those of SPMC may also be available. Amounts of previous grants have been typically in the range of \$100 to \$2500, but amounts awarded may exceed this range at the discretion of the Education→↑

Dealer Survey at Lancopex

The results of the 2018 Dealer and being good customers Survey are in, and the numbers please....

There was a good response from our vendors, 19 out of 22 (20 stamp dealers, food service, and the USPOD) returned their survevs (86.4%). 15 of the 19 respondents (79%) signed their surveys, an option on our sur-



Did vou meet vour financial goals? Yes-17, No-2 (89.5%). One dealer added that he exceeded his goals. Another noted "My goal is to have a good time with my show customers." Of the two dealers who did not meet their goals, one rated the show 7/10 while the other 10/10. Reasons offered for not meeting the goals was "Lack of customers" and "Slow traffic."

Recommendations for future stamp shows: "Continue to promote more traffic." "Keep the rain away." "The show was fine, but the building was cold on Friday and some lights were out." (Ed's note: When the venue manager was notified of the temperature, this was success*fully addressed.*)

What is special about LAN-**COPEX?** "Even better than last year and especially the York Show." "It has been great as in the last years." Seven dealers reported the impact of the club volunteers working the show, augmenting this with examples of their helping the dealers load/unload, referring customers to their tables, friendly attitudes.

themselves. Several appreciated the club's exceptional marketing and promotion of the show, the good attendance, and a great venue. As one dealer concluded, "This show was everything; it was very professional making it a well-run show."

Food Service at Lancopex: It is well known that the presence of good food is critical to the success of a stamp show. All 19 respondents (100%) remarked favorably of the Kasper's snack, beverage, and food offering. Several added appreciation to the donor (Truyde Greiner) who covered the cost of their lunches. From pulled pork to sausage, peppers, and onion sandwiches, and more, made the day as well as the macaroni and potato salads, hot dogs, lemon bars, brownies, and many others...all homemade.

On a scale of 1-10, how do you compare Lancopex to shows of a similar venue? Responses ranged from 7 to 10+ with an average of... (DRUMROLL)... 9.42/10.0; our best yet!

The health/growth of the hobby stands on three major players: the researchers, collectors, and dealers. Solid attendance at our show matched with happy dealers are the ingredients for a successful event. And as the dealers conveyed, success at Lancopex emanates from an active and engaged membership, good promotion, solid traffic, and great food. And while there was no assessment at the show regarding " customer happiness," it can be assumed with a large crowd and dealers who made their quotas. In other words, customers got what they came for, thus supporting that they were 'happy customers.'

PSLC Library

Members of the PSLC: I am heading up an effort to catalog and collate the individual philatelic libraries of the PSLC membership under the heading of the PSLC Library. The intent is to make available to the membership philatelic reference books for their research projects. To be sure, every one of our reference books is available at the American Philatelic Society (APS) Reference Library (or APRL) in Bellefonte, PA. However, Lancaster is a lot closer!

Many of us already borrow books from each other for our research work. But, why not have a listing of what's available for all members to use? It goes without saying that for this to work, our members must be willing to list your reference books and be willing to loan them to other members. This involves a lot of trust. But, if we cannot trust one another, we've all got a big problem. Sometimes our research work can be answered by a phone call or e-mail to a fellow member, if the researcher knows that the information he/she needs is sitting in a fellow member's library. In this case, physically borrowing the reference book may not be necessary.



A PSLC Philatelic Library Form will be sent separately and will serve as a format for the submission of the references (to include Submitter, Title, Author, Date, Comments). After you've sent in your individual listings, I will collate and alphabetize the list into a master list. Please use the comments section liberally. If the reference book subject is not obvious from the title, explain it. I want to consider auction catalogs as list-able references, too. Personally, I don't save too many auction catalogs, but I DO save Name sales. These usually represent the sale of a specialized collection, and they are usually very well written

A work like this will take a lot of time; both for you and for me. My goal is to have the list done before the end of this year. That said; don't wait until 1 December to submit your material.

Lancopex '18: Another Banner Stamp Show

Our annual two-day stamp show, Lancopex was held 27-28 April. Based on solid attendance and the positive metrics of the dealer surveys, it was a successful one. We had 20 dealers, a food service, and the USPOD with a full compliment of materials.



As someone noted, it was great to see the club president, officers, show chairmen, and other volunteers remain until the end after helping the dealers pack up their wares in the torrential rain.

It was a special occasion with 38 club volunteers plus family members working set-up, food service, the registration desk, show cover and donations sale table, security, and more. "Stamp Buddies" gave tours and worked with several families helping them navigate inherited collections before making recommendations regarding the disposition. Below is the 2018 show cover that commemorates the 125th Anniversary of the opening of the Columbian Exposition in Chicago (1 May through 30 October 1893). This cover contains an image of one of the expo's official picture postcards of the Fisheries Building along with a vignette of Columbus.



This is flanked by genuine expostamps. Scott #230, the 1-Cent

Columbian was used on the first day of the show, and Scott# 231, the 2-Cent Columbian appeared on Day-Two. A faux circular date stamp ties the Columbians to the covers. The show cancel features the Ferris Wheel which made its debut at the fair. This show centerpiece was America's answer to the Eiffel Tower of the 1889 Paris World's Fair.

The bourse was busy both days with 233 admission tickets taken, though this may be an underestimate. One hundred fifty programs were given out. Seen below are **Bob Kramer** and **Doug Milliken** at **WD Snyder's** cover table
