Until we hear from Stan, we proudly welcome these two ladies to our group:


## MEMBERSHIP ROSTER CONTINUES (to June 3,1990)

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

## POSTCARD CLUBS EXCHANGE NEWSLETTERS




We trust Susquehanna Valley had a good Show at Shamokin Dam on June 3.



# JUNE MEETING = THE ACTION IS AUCTION!

As was announced in last month's Newsletter - as well as at the May meeting - the 'program' for June will be our first LCPC POSTCARD AUCTION. Certainly, for most of us, it will still be an educational experience. And, in this case, lots of us will participate.

If auctions are new to you, watch the 'veterans'. The lots (see complete descriptive list with this Newsletter) will be displayed at 6 p.m. The winning bidders are those who spend time carefully examining sale items before the sale begins. Bring a pencil. Make notes about condition, highlights of the lots(if a lg. number of cards), and how high you will go.

Our auctioneers are amateurs, too, so they will go slowly, too! And if you feel you bought in error - return the lot as soon as possible. This makes corrections for the clerks much easier. Bring along cash, as checks will also impede the clerks. (If you run out of money, sit closer to a good friend.)

In any case, be sure to come to the June 18 meeting. AND HAVE FUN!!!
