LANCASTER COUNTY POSTCARDS by TUCK


"---Tuck's Raphotype series, --- undivided backs---. Printed in Holland, these cards are individually numbered as opposed to having a common set number. The Raphotype stock, as opposed to the Tuck Photochromes, has tended to chip and crack over the years, and these views today are considerably more difficult to locate in excellent condition."

Printing firms could make post cards from "any size Photo or Print" sent to them. "Hegatives were frequently shared by card firms---."
"Photo supply houses," which maintained negative files for view card and other putposes, were established in many cities. One can find the identical negative of a city building or street scene used by several or half a dozen publishers."

"---tampering with the negatives---" often occurred. "Pigures and vehicles were often blatantly superimposed upon the views, at times in serious violation of scale. Clouds are most obviously added to every negative.---A particular view of two gentlemen in an open automobile was apparently a favorite with the printers---. People were similarly transposed---"





E. Nash, the most prolific of American greeting publishers, issued 10 sets of July Fourth cards. Set #1 contained six comic sketches, one of which is shown here. The set is not difficult to complete. However, it does require a slightly nasty sense of humor. For instance, one card shows a boy offering a dog a candy-striped firecracker; another depicts a confrontation of park-bench sitters with neighborhood fire-cracker-toting youngsters. Others show the boys teasing women and girls with spit-devils and giant crack-

If your Fourth of July humor is more patriotic, you may appreciate Nash's other



sets which include eagle and flag motifs and share the celebration with far more patriotic zeal.



Remember, the topic for Exhibit Boards this month is <u>Patriotic Cards</u>. So even though the holidays have gone by, feel free to use postcards of Memorial/Decoration Day, Lincoln or Washington's birthdays, and anything else you feel is PATRIOTIC!

The whole idea of Exhibit Boards is to share. And that's what our Club is all about!
