


And for a pleasant resprite, enjoy these hand-made EASTER postcards from Pres. Earl.


Ed.note: For those beginners who are confused, post card can be spelled like that or like this - postcard. Rumor has it the latter became popular when advertisers were charged by the word. More important to remember is postal cards are official issues by the postal service and precharged (stamped) whereas post cards are privately published to which one must add postage. Most LCPC members collect postcards although you may also collect postal cards if you have a philatelic inclination. And, of course, the stamp collectors (philatelists) are interested in your post cards if the cancellation on your card is significant!

A SEASON FOR POSTCARD BOOKS





OVE BRASKERUD

One of the highlights of this year's Morlatton Postcard Show was meeting Ove Braskerud The 'old timers' know Ove to be a student of deltiology from Minnesota. He has recently become manager of The Cartephilians, a Connecticut based postcard company of which Jose Rodriguez is owner. Jose presented a fine program last year on RFD mail carriers on postcards.

I remarked to Ove that my Scandinavian history was lacking. When we reached that area of European History in school the teacher crammed two weeks into two days in order to 'get everything in'before the semester ended. I remember that Sweden became the cultural capital by pushing the illiterates to the east and west.
