





August theme will be **BIACKS** (as in the ethnic and social postcards depicting black people).






White box with captions is a 'sub-group' in the Hershey Bar postcard series.



Long skirts and parasols on this Hershey 222 Bar postcard date it to the 'early 1900's'




A 'sub-group' in the Hershey Bar series is not distinctive, having captions inside cocoa cans and printed with black and green ink.






Over twelve club members competed with 18 exhibit boards in the categories of Modern Cards, Home Towns and Topicals.

JOHN WISE
A PIONEER AERONAUT
1808-1879

John Wise was born in Lancaster on February 24, 1808. He was an apprentice cabinetmaker from age 16 to 21 and was employed briefly as a piano maker thereafter. He later said he became interested in ballooning as the result of an article in a German language newspaper when he was 14. In 1835, while living in Philadelphia, he decided to build his own balloon. On May 2, 1835 he made his first flight. Subsequent flights took place in many of the counties of Central Pennsylvania. He had made 463 flights during 44 years of ballooning.

Perhaps a Spring or Fall picnic next time would be welcomed by a larger group.


# WOULD WE HAVE ENDURED THIS WILTING WEATHER WITH THESE 3 FINE PARKS STILL HERE?

The schematic map of Lanc.City helps to unscramble locations of **postcard scenes** of three popular parks, two of which are unfamiliar to anyone under 55 years old.


Where Conestoga Woods homes line the bank lay Conestoga Park easily reached by open-air CTC cars down Potts Hill (E. King St). Smart horse rigs, canoes and strollers could be seen here on week-ends in the shadow of Witmer's Bridge.

Capt. John B. Peoples' steamers(another story) plied their route downstream to his amusement park - Summer Opera, moonlight-dancing, rollerskating, 50 ft. water slide and more!


Across from Peoples' was the youngster, Rocky Springs with airplane rides, carousel, swimming, boating, miniature RR, roller coaster and cold spring water fountains.




Conestoga, Peoples and Rocky Springs Parks as well as Williamson Park are marked. Williamson's Park, its Spring and Indian Rock are another story.



### 'ONE UP' ON THE SCRIBBLER

A recent New Era Scribbler column was titled Barber Rupert Danz, at 81, cuts hair 5 days a week and makes house calls. Coincidently your editor purchased only days before the accompanying pc by Nat'l.Press, Inc of North Chicago.

On the correspondence side it reads "In 1881 Adams Danz opened his first Barber Shop in this country at 106 Old Dorwart St. Lancaster, Pa. In 1884 his son George joined him, and in 1898 opened his first Barber Shop at 235 W. King St.

In 1926 George's son Ruppert, now the third generation of Barbers, joined his father and in 1944 opened his first Barber Shop in the Old Stevens House Hotel and remained there until it was demolished in 1963.


He then moved to his present location at 242½ W.King St. With 39\* years of experience and 3 generations background, you are assured that Ruppert Danz will barber you to your satisfaction.

His shop is air conditioned for your comfort. Cleanliness is his watchword. Try him. You're next!"

\*ED NOTE: This would date the pc about 1965.

Aside from it's being uncommon (as most barber shop pc's are) this must be nearly a record for most info.printed on a postcard!
