
We should all take a second look at Detroit postcards and appreciate the variety as well as the quality the company offered for more than 25 years.


Mr. Henry Bausman of Bausman, Pa received this Happy Birthday card. It's evident from the message on the real photo card that Henry shared a birthday with George Washington, though not the same year.



A Cyko real photo card shows Stevens Industrial School soon after it was dedicated. Note the young trees lining the front lane.

Children stand for their photo before Blanche Nevin's lion fountain on East King Street. Three boys have home-made scooters made with roller skate wheels. Just to the left of the largest tree, built into the wall of the reservoir, was a den with bars on it and a bear behind. You're 75 years old - or more, if you remember that.






A real photo shows the John Piersol McCaskey High School, Lancaster. It was built in 1937 for one million dollars and is still providing very good service. Henry Y. Shaub was the architect. The card, mailed in 1948 from the city to Conestoga, says, "We went to hear the chorus last nite and it was wonderful. I just finished ironing so I think I'll retire for the day."

In The News


This Lititz fixture has served generations of local folks. The popular restaurant and old-time soda fountain has seen owners come and go but the faithful customers always find good food and camaraderie at the North Broad Street business just across the street from Lititz Park.

Our pre-WWI b/w view by Express Print attributes the corner to Hiram Holtzhouse who also owned and operated Park View Hotel, seen through the trees on the left.

For the last two generations we've known it as Glassmyer's and, although it was recently bought by Yvonne and Stan Young, two faithful customers, they intend to continue the business as Glassmyer's. The exterior has changed little from this old view. Wouldn't it make a dandy colored postcard?



Lititz, Pa.-Residence of Hiram Holtzhouse and Keller's Confectionery, 23 N. Broad St.



York County's famous roadside attraction, The Shoe House, can be seen from the well-traveled Rte. #30, but accessed only from #462 (old #30 - the Lincoln Hwy) at Hellam. Mahlon Haines, an advertising eccentric who operated a chain of 40 shoe stores, built it in 1949.

The 3-bedroom, 2-bath home, completely furnished, is on the real estate market for \$129,900.

This Dexter card, #39227-C, from the 1970s, says The Shoe House features "old Pennsylvania Dutch ice cream smorgasbord. Create your own sundaes."

Your editor toured the home about that time. The ice cream was good. The stairs were many.

An outstanding collection of more than 300 business ads on match book covers. \$8 each.




Price is firm, however local postcards will be considered in trade.









Zinn's to Become Lyndon III

In more recent years, Lyndon City Line Diner has hosted Lancaster residents as well as dealers and patrons of our postcard expos with its convenient location just up the road from the Farm & Home Center at 1370 Manheim Pike. Card #D19173 is also by Dynacolor Graphics, with photography by Greenstein,

No Signs on Roof, Amos #2.

- 5. Koppel chrome #146178 published by Stel-Mar, photo by Marshall Dussinger. Note the light colored roof. After an intensive fire in 1978, this was replaced with the red roof seen in later views. The "second Amos" (with white suspenders and hay fork), was erected in June, 1969*.
- Dexter chrome #60057-C published by Jim E. Hess.
- Dexter chrome (no number) published by F. A. Woerner, Reading, Pa.
- Americana Souvenirs & Gifts chrome #L-99321-0; photo by Marshall Dussinger. This is continental size (4" x 6").

*Thanks go to John Klein for spotting this info in the July 16 issue of the Reading Eagle. Amos #1 was made of papier-maché and suffered badly from windstorms and vandals. Amos #2, the fiberglass/steel version, was erected in June 1969 and stands today (Aug. 2003) at the entrance. Negotiations continue to have him placed in a roadside museum.
