
### **Expo Data**

This postcard was published by Capsco, Inc., Washington, D.C. It was cancelled on January 21, 1985 at Dixon, IL, where Ronald Reagan grew up. The date was the Inauguration Day of his second term in office. An unprecedented outpouring of Americans honored our 40th President from the day he died, June 5, until he was laid to rest on June 12.



Several monotone cards labeled Custom Art relate early events in the life of Ronald Wilson Reagan. They have a 1980 copyright by Norman Ramsay, 5330 Midway Dr., NW, Cedar Rapids, Iowa and are signed by the artist. We show you two of them as an introduction to this memorial essay.




Those collectors who haven't yet developed a feel for chrome PCs are not familiar with the publisher Coral-Lee of Cordova, Ca or the printer Mike Roberts Color Productions of Oakland, CA. These two firms can be credited with excellent documentation of White House history for the past two generations.

From two extensive series of their cards, we have chosen a handful for you to enjoy in memorial to a man who brought dignity and national patriotism to the highest office in the country. Perhaps his suffering from Alzheimer's disease, which he acknowledged in 1994, was a blessing in disguise as it brought the dreaded disease to the nation's attention.

Captions beneath each illustration are from the back of that postcard.

First Lady, Nancy Reagan, son Ron Jr. and Ron's wife Doria are high-in the-sky aboard the Goodyear Blimp, "The America." Mom Nancy planned this novel surprise in celebration of his 23rd birthday. The threesome enjoyed a picnic lunch as they floated for 45 minutes above picturesque Northern Virginia. The President joined the celebration in the evening at a private White House dinner for Ron. May 20, 1981





Never before in the annals of American history have four presidents been pictured side-by-side in the White House. The unprecedented convocation was the tragic assassination of Egyptian Anwar Sadat in Cairo, Egypt. Due to the hazards and risks, White House aides advised against both President Reagan and Vice President Bush attending the services. Representing the United States at the funeral, three former presidents were in attendance: RICHARD M. NIXON (1969-74); GERALD R. FORD (1974-77 and JIMMY CARTER (1977-81). October 8, 1981





Mrs. Reagan said her husband's acknowledgment helped lift the stigma many people associated with Alzheimer's

"They didn't know it was a disease, like any other disease," she said. "He helped dispel that. And now it is amazing how many people come up and say to me that their mothers and fathers and husbands and somebody in their family has Alzheimer's. Now they're free to talk about it. So he did a great thing."


Mrs. Reagan was asked how she has learned to deal with his condition.


"You just do it; you just get up and take each day as it comes and put one foot in front of the other. You just love."

Never one to take partisan political positions, Evangelist Billy Graham has long been associated with American Presidents. Going back to the administration of Harry Truman, Graham has been a friend and "unofficial" advisor to Chief Executives. At times he has held religious services at the White House and taken part in many historic events. After spending the night in the White House, the Grahams are bidding farewell to the Reagans. July 1981

President and Mrs. Reagan exchange gifts at their first White House Christmas. First Lady Nancy often says, "My life really began when I met Ronnie". When he is speaking, she follows his every word. Here, their admiring glances attest to their mutual affection. December 24, 1981

President Reagan enjoys his Thanksgiving visit to Del Cielo in the Santa Ynez Mountains near Santa Barbara, California. Nancy and the President ride horseback for a few hours in the mornings, and in the afternoon he cuts and clears brush. This life gives him solitude and a sense of making one's own way - his house is heated solely by wood and uses all he can stack. Here we see him taking a breather, listening to frogs, noticing deer, and inhaling the brilliant expanse of unpolluted air. November 24, 1981







In Korea, First Lady Nancy Reagan invited Lee Kil Woo, 8, (left) and Ahn Ji Sook, 7, to the United States for lifesaving heart surgery. The children traveled to the U.S. aboard Air Force One, then spent some time with the Reagans at the White House. The surgeries were a complete success, and the children soon returned home after their "miraculous" surgery and the attention of an equally marvelous friend-inneed. November 12, 1983

President Reagan in this appealing image as an All-American man says many things to many Americans. Popular adoration is summed up by a Senior Citizen sign displayed at a Reagan rally: "Ronnie's not getting older, he's getting better." Men, too, relate to those muscles and the epitome of the work ethic. Who can resist that impish smile and the watch cap? "We're glad to have a leader who physically and symbolically takes such a challenging stance." August 10, 1984

President Reagan and his Golden Retriever, Victory, take a breather from ranch work at Rancho del Cielo. From the warm color of his coat to his broad and sensitive face, every aspect of this dog reflects his gentle and friendly disposition. Victory was given to the Reagans by a supporter who knew Rancher Reagan would enjoy his warm companionship, sweet face, and loyalty. The dog enjoys the run of the ranch and is happiest when his loving master returns to the ranch for a sojourn. August 1984



### A Century of American Railroading On Picture Postcards

In early June I had the pleasure of meeting Geoff Stunkard, a 40-year old career photojournalist. It was while I was tending Jim Morrison's postcard stand at Renninger's Antique Market. Geoff makes the trip to Lancaster County from his home in Tennessee at least once a year. He knew just where to look for Trains and RR Depots, and while he searched, I enjoyed scanning the book, *Rail Mail*, which he published himself in early spring.

Rail Mail combines the history of American railroads and the postcard medium in one place, explaining how both the railroads and the public made use of postcards. Profusely illustrated, it includes chapters on depots, narrow gauge lines, streamliners, accidents, and more.

Interspersed with the historical information are special tips on collecting postcards covering buying and selling, as well as a glossary. A bonus is the value guide to each of the 200 illustrated cards.

The perfect bound, gloss color covered book has 128 pages (eight in full color) printed on coated stock. It retails for \$17.95 plus \$5 first class shipping (a bargain in this writer's opinion). Sep. 1907. Lanc. to Middletown, Pa. A fine place to get wild flowers.

Sept. 27, 1911. (Mailed in envelope.)

The children and I went to the Lancaster Fair. There was a thunder shower in the afternoon and we all got sprinkled before we could get in the train. (Special fair trains ran from the Chestnut Street railroad depot to the fairgrounds, stopping on the rear of the fair, as opposed to the main entrance on Harrisburg Pike — where you enter the Donnelley property today.)

No date Lititz to Manheim.

Dear cousin, Do you have any geese eggs at present? Please let us know if you have any or not.

Apr. 1914. Within Lancaster,

Meet me at Kirk Johnson's Music Store Saturday at 3 o'clock. I think I will buy a piano. Be sure and be there.

May 1, 1907. Millersville to Milton Grove. Many, many thanks for the arbutus. It certainly was very much enjoyed.

### BUCH'S DRUG STORE Corner of West King and Charlotte Sts., Lancaster, Penna.

Now occupies the site which was formerly the Old Plow Tavern – Built 1745, Demolished 1924. History says that on the register were the names of General George Washington and General Lafayette. When General Lafayette made his memorable visit here in 1825, he was banqueted at this splendid old hostelry."

The text above describes postcard #20925 printed by Koppel and published by James Hess who also took the photograph more than 30 years ago.

The building recently made the news.

Ganse Pharmacy succeeded Buch's Drug Store in 1980. It's undergoing extensive interior renovations. Red Rose Awards occupies the Charlotte St. portion of the first floor. It was a sporting goods store when managed by the Buch family. The four apartments above will become two large apts.

After the old Plow Tavern was razed, the present structure housed the Colonial Motor Co. a Star and Flint auto distributor and the Wheatland Auto Co. which specialized in Kelly-Springfield tires and tubes.
