
Major-President

Chickadee-dee-dee-dee

"Snow birds" are northern people who travel to the warm South for the winter, just as the slate-colored juncos come to PA from Canada.

The little Chickadee, however, fends for itself here in PA twelve months of the year. Recent studies tell us the number of "dee-dee-dees" are an alarm; the more "dees," the larger the little bird's predator.

Library Highlight
AMERICAN EXPOSITION
POSTCARDS
(1870-1920)
By Frederic and Mary Megson

This catalog is an encyclopedia of information about the postcards and postal cards of the great American expositions—international, national, and interstate—before 1920. Its purpose is to serve as a source book for collectors, and to provide a solid basis for serious research in postcard history.

Included in this catalog are government postal cards and private postcards — the latter in their various equivalents, "Souvenir Post Card," "Private Mailing Card," etc. Omitted are album cards with blank backs even if they had been sent through the mail as postcards.

Cards that have an exposition name, logo, or view on the front, and issued before the close of the exposition have been listed. Included, for example, are those which show exposition officials, proposed sites, groundbreaking ceremonies and exposition and exhibitor advertising issued before or during the show. Real photo postcards are included when they are part of a commercially-made series.

The six holiday greeting cards are by a Parisian publisher and, although they are similar in appearance, four (those in the corners) are in Series No. #49, while the top center is from Series #29 and the lone horizontal card is from Series #48. Their pastel colors are similar and all are dosed with snowflakes. What isn't apparent is that the snowflakes were applied last and can actually felt as "dots" when you pass you fingers across the cards. This isn't a feature unique to French greetings, but it isn't a common PC occurrence either.

None of the postcards have cancellations. As was often the custom, postcards were mailed in one envelope, particularly if several — in this case, five — were all dated by the sender, November 22, 1917, one of which was stamped "Passed Censor" and then bluepencil initialed. The sixth card was mailed on Dec. 8, 1917 and has the same "Passed Censor" stamp and is also blue-pencil initialed but by different postmaster.

Most important to local readers are the names of the sender and recipients for they are all familiar family names.

Harry E. Erisman, Seaman 2nd Class, mailed all of the cards from the Naval Base Hospital #5 somewhere in France.

Two of the Nov. 22 cards went to 226 N. Pine St., Lancaster, one to his father, W. N. Erisman and the other to his sister Mildred.

Two Nov. 22 cards went next door to 224 N. Pine St. to his grandmother and his grandfather, Mr.

and Mrs. H. L. Simon, no doubt his mother's parents. All of the above four cards held brief Christmas or New Year greetings from the doughboy. A fifth card, also mailed on Nov. 22 went to Grandfather with an additional note "I will send a check soon for \$36."

The remaining card, mailed on Dec. 8, 1917 was also sent to Harry's mother and father at their 226 N. Pine St. address.

Erisman is a well known name in Lancaster and the 1919 city directory finds Erismans working at a variety of jobs – jobs that helped make Lancaster a city of industrious people way back then. An Erisman was a teacher, another a caretaker, and a planer, a warper and a printer; a plumber, a watchmaker, an engraver, and a store clerk; a turnkey, a machinist, a stenographer and a waitress. But the Erisman most of us remember – if we were fortunate enough to live during his lifetime – was George F. K. Erisman.

George had his shop on E. Orange St. and E. King St but the one most of us remember was at 315 West Orange Street. The Erisman Doll Hospital was a city landmark from the teens through the 1950s. If you were a little girl you took in your favorite doll and knew the "doctor" would fix it. If you were a little boy, you searched through neat old costumes (or more likely bits and pieces), to make your own Halloween costume. And there were flags, banners, studio props and stage make-up - everything you couldn't find anywhere else in town.

The sole paper item we've located for Geo. F. K. Erisman is an undated non-postcard. A Toy Shop was included at his early locations.

Heinitsh Drug Store 16 West King St., Lancaster, Pa

The Heinitsh family founded and operated an apothecary shop on King Street from 1780 until 1934 – 154 years! The family was rightly proud of its heritage and put its history on the bottom of its divided back postcard which features its store. It is a fairly rare card. Though not marked, it's probably published by L. B. Herr & Co.


It reads as follows: 1780 Carl Heinrich Heinitsh, 1803 August Heinitsh, 1815 Heinitsh & Co., 1818 J. F. Heinitsh, 1841 J. F. Heinitsh & Son, 1849 Charles A. Heinitsh, and 1899 S. W. Heinitsh

I would speculate that this card was printed not long after 1907 from the peoples' clothes. Take note of the two gentlemen looking out the second story windows. One would probably assume some of the Heinitsh family themselves.


The sign on the left side of the bldg. notes a John F. Heinitsh ran the Heinitsh Paint Co. from this same location. The paint company is listed at other locations in later years. (See illustrated trade card.) It is also interesting to note the unusual window display on the right. Is it an odd construction of crutches? It's difficult to tell.


Charles Heinitsh, who was the owner from 1841 to 1898, was the first president of The Pennsylvania Pharmaceutical Association in 1882. He was then chosen head of the American Pharmaceutical Assn.

The Heinitsh building still stands today although it would be difficult to recognize if the Lancaster County Historical Society had not put a plaque on the right side in 1976. I would speculate from the PC that the building was remolded in the 1870-80 period adding a third floor as well as the Italianate details to the original colonial building.
