




I will again allow some time for show and tell. I'm sure some member has an interesting postcard story or a postcard to show and talk about.

THE FURNACES OF



CHICKIES IRON COMPANY'S FURNACE, CHICKIES, PA.

COLUMBIA AND MARIETTA

IN THE LATER 1800S THE IRON INDUSTRY AROUND COLUMBIA AND MARIETTA WAS QUITE EXTENSIVE. THERE WERE SEVERAL REASONS FOR THIS.

FIRST THERE WAS THE RAW MATERIAL SUCH AS IRON ORE, LIMESTONE, TREES FOR MAKING CHARCOAL AND COAL FROM UPSTATE.

SECOND THERE WAS TRANSPORTATION. THE PENNSYLVANIA CANAL ENDED IN COLUMBIA AND JUST ACROSS THE RIVER THE SUSQUEHANNA AND TIDEWATER CANAL STARTED. FROM COLUMBIA THE PIG IRON, WHICH WAS WHAT THESE FURNACES MADE, WAS SHIPPED BY RAIL ON THE COLUMBIA AND PHILADELPHIA RAIL ROAD TO PHILADELPHIA AND ANYWHERE ELSE THEY WERE TO GO. WHEN THE IRON WAS TO GO SOUTH IT COULD GO BY THE SUSQUEHANNA AND TIDEWATER CANAL TO BALTIMORE AND OTHER POINTS IN THE SOUTH. ALSO THE RIVER PROVIDED A MEANS OF GETTING WOOD FROM UPSTATE TO THIS AREA FOR MAKING CHARCOAL.


THE THIRD THING WAS THE AVAILABILITY OF THE IRON ORE. GRUBB'S MINE WAS THE LARGEST SUPPLIER IN THE LOCAL AREA. THERE WERE SOME SMALLER IRON PITS LOCALLY BUT NOT NEAR THE SIZE OF GRUBB'S. THE NEXT LARGE IRON SUPPLIER WAS CORNWALL IRON MINE. IT WAS A LARGER MINE THAN GRUBBS AND ITS RAW MATERIAL COULD BE BROUGHT IN BY THE PRR OR THE COLUMBIA AND READING RAIL ROAD.

IN ORDER OF THEIR BUILT DATE, THE FIRST TO BE BUILT WAS THE SARAH ANN FURNACE, LOCATED TWO MILES ABOVE SILVER SPRING, WAS BUILT IN 1839, THEN CAME THE SHAWNEE FURNACE, LOCATED AT 5TH AND MILL ST. IN COLUMBIA, IT WAS BUILT IN 1844, THEN CAME THE HENRY CLAY FURNACE, LOCATED BETWEEN BREEZY VIEW ROCK AND CHICKIES ROCK, IT WAS BUILT IN 1845.

THE FOURTH FURNACE TO BE BUILT WAS THE CHICKIES #1, LOCATED ON THE NORTH SIDE OF CHICKIES HILL, IT WAS BUILT IN 1845, THEN CAME THE DONEGAL FURNACE, LOCATED BETWEEN CHICKIES ROCK AND


MARIETTA BORO, IT WAS BUILT IN 1847, NEXT WAS MARIETTA #1 & #2 IN THE SMAE APPROXIMATE LOCATION AS THE DONEGAL, IT WAS BUILT IN 1847 TO 1849.

THE 7TH TO BE BUILT WAS THE CORDELIA FURNACE, LOCATED IN IRONVILLE, IT WAS BUILT IN 1848, NEXT WAS THE CHICKIES #2, LOCATED JUST NORTH OF CHICKIES #1, IT WAS BUILT IN 1854, NEXT CAME THE ST. CHARLES FURNACE, LOCATED JUST NORTH OF COLUMBIA, IT WAS BUILT IN 1854, AND FINALLY THE VESTA, LATER KNOWN AS THE LAVINO FURNACE, LOCATED NORTH OF CHICKIES #2, IT WAS BUILT IN 1868.




THIS IS THE VESTA FURNACE

LCPC MEMBER INTERVIEW



Charles Richard "Bud" Heim was born in the Columbia Hospital, Columbia, PA. He has lived all his life in the Columbia area. He played drums in his younger years and played football in High School graduating in 1952. Soon after graduation he joined the U. S. Navy. After boot camp he was trained as a diesel engine mechanic and served on a mine sweeper out of Charleston, SC. When he was discharged from the Navy he returned to Columbia and married Barbara Barnett. Bud and Barb celebrated their 50th Wedding Anniversary in 2007. They have one daughter Shelly and two sons Mitch and Mike. They also have 2 granddaughters, Ashley and Blaire. Bud is now retired but his working life was spent first at Bendix Co. in York where he was a supervisor and at Motter Press in York where he was a purchasing agent.

Bud became interested in postcards in the 1960's after he received some Columbia postcards from his mother in law. The collection has grown to over 5,000 postcards of York and Lancaster county, Hershey, Columbia, Marietta, and other towns along the Susquehanna river. In the 1970's Bud bought and sold at flea markets and purchased a very large collection of assorted Columbia items. Lloyd Mifflin paintings, postcards, photos, booklets, 1888 Columbia directory plus many other items.

Bud and Barb are long time LCPC members, numbers 77 and 78. They have faithfully served the club in many ways over the years. The programs he has presented are always well received and he always has one ready to present when asked. We have all enjoyed their hospitality when the club picnics are held at their home. Bud said he enjoys getting together with people that share the same interest.

Postcards and local history are only a few of Bud's hobbies. I'm always amazed at his many talents when I visit his garage. He seems to always be improving his very detailed model train displays, scale model amusement park rides, paper weights, glitter pictures, etc. Another talent is carving and his hand carved Noah's Ark is really a masterpiece. His restored 1930 Chevy coupe is a show stopper.

In closing I would like to say that Bud is always willing to share his knowledge of local history by showing his postcards, photos, directories and over 2500 area slides.
