

Tom Beck's September Program, Lancaster beyond Penn Square to the North covered major views of the last 100 years from N. Queen St. to Rossmere (George Ross's estate) and the Armstrong Floor Plant. The familiar landmarks brought back memories and we appreciate his and Betty's efforts using a PowerPoint presentation. The title suggests his future programs will seek other directions.

If you "put it in writing" (and this includes e-mail) you're committed, and these are Jere Greider's own words, "The (October) program "This 'n That," will be my first attempt at a Power-Point presentation. I will be showing a sample of cards from several topics I like - Coca-Cola, Mountville and 3 other topics. Brader's Drive-In & Miniature Golf Course was approximately across the LH on the north side of the road. Tichnor printed this linen PC #82034. Lancaster had two great choices for miniature golf - Brader's and the American Miniature Golf Course, east of Leola; both worth driving the extra miles to reach.

Ron's legacy to the postcard world will be two books he researched and authored, A Picture Postcard History of Baseball (1992) and Propaganda Postcards of World War II (2000). 



Dot Fry, LCPC's 3rd president, taught in several one-room school houses, the last at Fetter's in <u>Hopeland</u>. Jay and Ginny Lutz, former pupils, had a reunion for Dot's pupils. Ida Salinda Stover (class of 1934-35) had made this drawing way back then and Dot kept it. It was used 60 years later as this postcard to announce the picnic.

There's no debate - Express Printing Co. / John Zook of Lititz, was the largest printer and/or publisher of County postcards, not just for himself, under the Express Print name, but for dozens of other publishers in small villages and towns around Lancaster County. Here's a prime example of a card showing five offers plus a price list of PC blanks he could ship to local merchants should they wish to add their own views. This Gothic "Post Card" sample is just one of a half dozen postcard logos used by Zook.



QSL postcards were mailed from one amateur radio operator to another telling them when, and more importantly, how far away they picked up the transmission. PCs had unique motifs such as this one showing the steeple of the Trinity United Evangelical Church in Manheim. The radio operators were (Padre) Richard and Jane Emery.








World War II Armed Service Branches consisted of the Army, Navy, Marines, Air Force and Coast Guard. More often than not, the Coast Guard was absent as this 1941 Tichnor linen PC shows. The majority of WWII comic (and non-comic) cards featured soldiers and sailors so you can deduce that Marines and Coast Guard postcards are considerably harder to find.
















Here are excerpts from postcard messages World War II servicemen (and a WAVE) sent home to loved ones, most while they trained here in the states. Not realizing it then, they were soon to become Our Greatest Generation.

12/24/42, Camp Blanding, FL-I hope you all had a good Xmas. It doesn't seem like Xmas here. Not to me anyhow. 1/11/43, Fort Logan, CO-Glad to hear you are PFC. This is a swell place. It sunshines all the time. School is swell. I have a 94 average. I will finish in five wks. but don't know where I'll be.

3/5/43, Cudahy, WI. Here I am in America's Dairyland. Lots of cows, beer, cold weather and blondes. Arrived Tues. in zero temperature after I was used to Spring weather. Picked up a bad cold but so has practically everybody else. People out here are very hospitable. Think I will like it when it warms up. Went to town last night and had a hot chocolate.

3/5/43, Farragut, ID. I spend 7 ½ hrs. a day in school and lately I've been going to school for 1 ½ hr. ea. night. This is a 16-wk. course. I hope to get into aviation radio. That will be 3 more months but I like it. I have a 50/50 chance of graduating with a third class Petty officer's rating. I must take the code at 22 words per min., type 40 words per min. and an avg. not less than 3.5 in any studies. 3.3 is 87 ½. We have English, Spelling, Typing, Seamanship and of course, Morse code. So you can see besides my washing and other things I have to do I'm pretty busy.

3/22/43, Greenville, PA – I am a baker without a bakery. They buy their bread here so now I am an assistant cook.

4/12/43, Ephrata, WA – Hello Sr. de Chantal. I wish to thank you very much for the St. Benedict's medal. Am enjoying Army life in Washington, but am far from home. 4/18/43, Wash., DC (WAVE quarters) – Everything grand.

4/18/43, Wash., DC (WAVE quarters) – Everything grand. Quarters are super (a room to myself) but as soon as barracks are finished at Mt. Vernon Seminary we will probably move out there.


5/4/43, Camp Hood, TX – I'm in 5th Regt., not the 50th. Out of envelopes & ink. Got \$10 and letter today. Thanks. Worked Fri. nite, Sat. all day & will work tonite & tomorrow. Pretty tired but well.

6/4/43, St. Louis, MO – Arrived in St. Louis at 9. Boy did I have a dirty ride. So far we look like nigers and they had no water to wash on the train. Will write later.

7/24/43, Balt. MD – I have been a "90 day wonder" for a month now and I love it. Are you being good and sticking to your diet?

7/27/43, Miami, FL – I was in swimming this afternoon but the water was too warm – 80. I don't know what branch of Air Force I'm in yet but chances look good.

8/10/43, Cedartown, GA – This afternoon we plan on going swimming with a couple of girls that we got acquainted with. There (sic) not bad.



8/17/43, APO NYC (Passed by Army Examiner) – Here is a souvenir of Sicily for you. I suppose you'll still prefer the hills at home. I know these are a little too rough to suit me – you can fall off practically anywhere.


10/21/43, Camp Claiborne, LA – I've finally been assigned to an outfit so maybe I'll stay in one place long enough for some mail to catch up to me. 393^{rd} is on bivouac out in the wilderness about 13 miles from Camp. We live in 6-man tents, no lights, field kitchen, etc. This is a specials service heavy equip. regt. I came here as a rope rigger but don't know what I'll end up doing. I was on guard duty last nite so have today off. Am trying to catch up on my writing. I may get a short furlough soon. If so, I'll see you.

And then the casualties of the war-

6/17/44, USN Hospital, Sampson, NY – I am OK. Hope you are the same. Kiss the kids for me.

6/28/44, Quantico, VA – Dear Boys, Daddy is unable to read and write much. I have sore eyes and couldn't see. Little better now.






8/26/44, Fort Ord, CA, Mother dear, the liberation of Paris is a good occasion to send back to you this card you bought in Paris and gave me six years ago. Some day Ruth and I shall go and see what is left of these treasures of the ages. (Left above – Venus de Milo in the Louvre.)

11/11/44, APO, SF (Passed by Army Examiner) This card is a duplication so your sister may trade it for two domestic ones. This was just like a day in summer here today and a beautiful moon tonight. Daddy.

5/4/45, APO NY – Dearest Mother – Happy Mother's Day! Sure wish I could be there to spend the day with you. Hope you got my flowers I sent you. I love you.

7/14/45, Deer Lodge, MT – Still on the train and seeing new things all the time. We are stopped in Butte for a few minutes. Dad should have some of these beef steaks on the farm. There are hundreds of them on the range. Save these cards for my scrapbook that I sent you. And a day later - 7/15/45, Seattle, WA – Arrived OK by train in Seattle. Am waiting for a taxi now to go to the ferry and then to Bremerton. This is sure a beautiful place.

10/14/45, San Diego, CA – Arrived in Dago today and will leave for shakedown the first of the week. Saw Tubby's old airport and Spongy's boot camp. This is the nicest town. I love been on the west coast. Hope you get all your work finished before it snows.

Bernhardt Wall's Jack-o-Lanterns

Bernhardt Wall (1872 - 1956) began a career as a lithographic illustrator in 1889 working primarily as a commercial artist. He soon became known as the "Postcard King" and designed over 5,000 comic cards. In 1915 Wall visited the West making etchings of Indians and cowboys. These proved to be very successful. He continued to produce many fine etchings and by 1930 had also become a much respected historian of the region. Bernhardt Wall drew the etchings for his books, printed and bound them. His books are in libraries and universities around the world, in the private collections of J. P. Morgan, Franklin D. Roosevelt, and more. Who else has etched Teddy Roosevelt, Warren Harding, Wm. Howard Taft, Calvin Coolidge, Sam Houston, Mark Twain, Tom Edison, Abe Lincoln, and Andrew Jackson? These Halloween cards are Wall's work. They're scary. Is it the witches? Or the cats? Or the Jacko-lanterns and their teeth?
