## Manheim Township Public Library Program Update

Our Postcard Club has arranged with the Manheim Township Public Library to do a series of programs about our great hobby of postcard collecting. Each program will start at 6:30 pm and following is a description of each program.

January 29 - "Collecting Postcards". Postcard Club 2013 President Mark Arbogast will lead a panel of three Postcard Club members who will discuss different aspects of the interesting hobby of postcard collecting. Jere Greider will talk about the history of postcards - pioneer to photochrome and real photos, showing examples and talking about each era. Dede Schaeffer and Sharon Gromis will discuss their personal areas of interest in postcard collecting.

February 5 - Tom Beck will present "Penn Square And Beyond". Take a nostalgic, digital walk, via postcards, to the Lancaster of Old. Enjoy scenes taken in the early 1900's of the city that include cobblestone streets, old street lamps, and buildings that still stand after 100 years of service. Some of the old postcards offered in this presentation will be scenes of Penn Square, Hager's, Watt & Shand, the old Woolworths, the 3-S Store, the YMCA, Garvin's, and more. A brief historical note will be offered for some cards.

I had no hard time getting a job either. You may be sure I feel relieved. If there is any mail comes in there for me please bring it along home Sat. This is all. My love to all, Lizzie. V.L.

#### **Neck Strap**

Nov. 21, 1911, Landisville. To Mrs. Benj. Forrey, Columbia. Dear Sister, We got home all right but we left our neck strap there. M. said he had it on the horse & so I guess it is in the stable maybe. I want you folks to come over next Sunday the 29<sup>th</sup> if you can. M. left Thurs. at 10:45. I seen him off & went to Mills' for dinner. Am having them out too. Mammie is just about the same – still in bed. Charlie don't seem to be much better they said. Isn't this awful weather? Sister.

#### Rubbers

Sept. 3, 1913, New Providence. To Mrs. Herr, Gordonville. Dear Cousin, We arrived home safely. Got home in good time but I forgot my rubbers . Send them along with Edna if she gets out this way on Saturday. Your cousin, Lotta.

## Missed Breakfast

Mar. 22, pre-1908, Lanc. To Anna Landis, Lancaster R #8. Have Pa Landis attend to that clock, for Elmer missed his breakfast on Monday morning.

## An Evening with "Vic"

Feb. 13, 1917, Lanc. To Ms Lillian Smith, Shippen St., Lanc. Dear Lillian, Ivy wants you to come down to hear the Victrola tomorrow evening. I mean Wed. evening. Come over for me first. Come early.

#### Waist

Aug. 6, 1910, Lancaster. To Mrs. Laura Fulton, York, Pa. I am sending your waist. I hope it will be O.K. I didn't do anything but put new cuffs on the sleeves. Florence.

#### Readymade

Mar. 15, 1912, Lanc. To Anna Stine, Klinesville, Berks Co. Dear Cousin, Will see you about 2 or 3 weeks from now. Have decited (sic) to buy everything readymade, so don't expect to sew for me. Best regards to all. From Minnie.


Feb. 21, 1906, Lancaster. To Henry Bausman, Bausman, Pa. With best wishes for a happy birthday. Martha H. Ranck.

## Is House Cleaning a Thing of the Past?


May 10, 1910, Lanc. To Miss Anna <u>Greenly</u>, Elizabethtown (on a <u>Green</u>wood Cemetery view.) Dear Sister, Received your card. You must be having a good time. Why don't you come and help me clean house? I'm having the paper hangers this week. Am soon through cleaning. Be sure and come on Sat. Be sure and let me know if you will come for supper and if G. S. is coming down on Sunday. I will make baked beans and bring my big hat along - if you can know what I mean, if you don't have your hands full. Charles can hardly wait. Your sister, I. N.



(Mailed in env. = no date or address; To Mrs. Whorley Well we are almost done cleaning house. We been at it for 4 weeks. I think this week will finish it and I am glad of it. Well good old summertime is here. I'ii soon take a trip to the Mountains - Pen Mar. Do you go there?

Oct. 4, 1910, Lanc. To Mrs. Kindell, West Philadelphia. Dear Aunt, Will you let me know as soon as you get this when you are going to send for me as I will have to let Aunt Hattie know. She wants me to come a week when she cleans house to keep Erla. So let me know in about how many weeks. We have our third floor cleaned and part of the second floor. Mother is going to York Fair. I have my pass to come down to your house. Ans. soon. Helen.

Wild West, Graduation, Autos, Carpets and Garden May 21, 1908, Lanc. To Miss Hollinger, Washington, DC Mr. Motter was here last evening and inquired about you Edith has gone south and will be around to see you. How are you? Write soon. On Sat. the Great Wild West will be here. On the 31<sup>st</sup> I am to go to Aunt Carrie's. A. W. Zuck of Bareville graduated last week. Keep control of your automobile. We have the carpets up for the paper hangers in the halls. Job was here on Sun. Brother is here; will not return to Palmyra, NY. We have another sharp eye -Teddy. My garden looks thriving, eatables good; rainy weather at present. Good-by. Affectionately, Mother.

#### Saddened Boarders


Feb. 4, 1908, Lanc. To Mr. Wm. Simpson, Parkesburg, Pa. Dear Brother, Max sent check for Feb. My kind friend, Mrs. Landis died a week ago after an illness of ten days. Was buried last Fri. afternoon 3-3:30. Her loss is felt deeply with all within her walls. Was a good mother to each boarder. I've been unsettled for two weeks about getting another place, but they say they want them all to stay. Poor Mrs. Portner went unexpectedly after all. Wasn't well enough to go her funeral. Marie wrote me a nice letter and sent a funeral notice. Annie wrote me too. A lovely day and pleasant now. Anna.

#### Plain Folks

Jan. 9, 1914 (No PM) From Mary B. to Mary Petersheim, Groff's Store, Lanc. County (view is Amish People in Penn Square.) Well, Susie, are you'ns all well? This is for Mary – still going ahead. Pap is pretty well. He can brease [breathe] fine out here, but I have a bad cold last night and today and a good bit cough, and this morning it snows some. This now I must stop. Some supper is near done. I think we'll be at Sam Becker's for supper. Hope your all well. Good bye, bye. Write soon.

Aug. 26, 1966, Lanc. To Eli S. Stoltzfus, Bird-in-Hand, Pa. Dear Parents, Greetings. Well we are home again. Were home at 9:30. Had a nice time. Were at the Zoo and stopped in a Valley Forge on the way down. Then we were also at Phila. Airport when those big jets take off. Sure was ineresting. Maybe I'll be up next Wed. if we can get to see you at Sam's. Am washing. Bye Bye, Sadie.






#### **Hot Politics and Peanuts**


# 100<sup>th</sup> Year for YWCA Building

On Jan. 27, 1919 Isaac Steinfeldt ordered 1,000 copies of this w/b view from the Curt Teich Co. The YWCA bldg. was erected in 1912 on a tract of land purchased from the Shippen School. The "Y" initially intended to use the building that housed teachers from the school but instead razed it and built this "modern" structure. Also included here is a RP taken of the YWCA in the 1950's by an unknown photographer.



# **Border Towns on Postcards**


With apologies to our friends along the Susquehanna, we've bi-passed those communities along the river that show up on postcards. These River Towns are NOT Border Towns since they lie well within the western border of Lancaster County - where the river's waters lap up against the York County soil. Why so? In case you forgot (or never knew) when York County was formed from Lancaster County, the Susquehanna River remained an integral part of Lancaster County. Both counties, to be sure, join forces when calamities occur on the river and, together, we all enjoy the pleasures it offers. But Lancaster River Towns are not Lancaster Border Towns.



So we begin our story in the Far Upper West with Bellaire, a teeny, tiny uyh community northeast of Elizabethtown, along the Conewago Creek separating Dauphin from Lancaster County. The sole card (a real photo) that we've encountered in 40+ years of searching is Bellaire Park. It shows a wading pool approx. 10'x20' with eight youngsters cooling off from the summer heat. The unused card has a stamp box showing the paper stock is from the 1918-1930 era. The children's bathing suits support the time. C. Deininger was the first PM when the Bellaire P. O. opened July 17, 1884. When it closed Apr. 30, 1907, it became part of the RFD system for Elizabethtown.


We're skipping the "huge" metropolis of Adamstown. (It'll be considered on another day.) Scooting down along the county's eastern side, our next community is **Cambridge**. A true border town, the larger part of it is in Lancaster County; about 1/3 of it is in Chester County. It lies between Rte. #322 and #340. Our sole view is the <u>Cambridge Union S.(unday) S.(chool) Chapel</u> which is in the Lancaster County section of the town. The b/w, u/b PC was published by Graphic Print in nearby Honey Brook. Cambridge's first PM was J. W. Irwin when the P. O. opened Jan. 30, 1851. It closed Sept. 16, 1944 with mail becoming part of the Honey Brook (Chester Co.) system. Shown is the rev. of a linen view of Pittsburgh mailed with a Sept. 4, 1939 Cambridge cancel. Fritz and Gussy sent it to Eliz. in E-town.









Where Churchtown Rd. and Cains Rd. meet on Route #340 we found the village of Cains. The sole card, once again published by Graphic Print of Honey Brook, like our view in Cambridge, is a church; this time Pequea Baptist Church (and numbered #16). It's also a b/w, u/b but with a different back. The first PM when the P. O. of Cain's opened Jan. 5, 1828 was J. Cain. On Dec. 1, 1894 the official name was changed — dropping the apostrophe.\* The P. O. closed Apr. 15, 1942 with mail going to the Gap RFD system. A 1920 Cains cancel is shown. The message on the "generic" Cain card (mailed in 1934) includes, "A large crowd at the festival last Sat. eve at White Horse. Goldie and I played Bingo and I won 2 time a run & then I stopped. S.K. H."



\*During the term of Pres. Benj. Harrison the Post Office Dept. (John Wanamaker, Postmaster General) formed a **U.S. Board on Geographic Names**. Among other edicts, including the shortening of P.O. names was the elimination of the apostrophe in a P. O. name. Many other changes subsequently took effect. Why? The number of P.O.'s had increased from 18,417 in 1850 to 62,401 in 1890!



A stone's throw to the east of Cains is Compass. The view is of St. John's P.(rostestant) E.(pisciple) Church. For a third time we have a b/w, u/b view of a church by Graphic Print, Honey Brook (and again, with a different back). Now, an apology is in order to our good friends in Chester County. When the Compass P. O. opened Aug. 10, 1896 the first P. M. was H.H. Ammon and it was a Chester Co. P. O., as it was when it closed Feb. 15, 1918, though the mail then became part of the Gap (Lanc. County) RFD system. The village, true, is largely in Chester County, but when visited, we saw this church is in Chester County, but its graveyard is in Lancaster County. So call it as you will – put the PC where you wish.



A few miles south of Cains, barely a mile from the county line is **Limeville**. The only PC we've found has a narrow (3"x5½") dimension reminiscent of Hershey bar cards. It is of <u>The Limeville Schoolhouse</u> "...recently converted and furnished for modern vacation living. For rental info. write: Elmer D. Zimmerman, Intercourse, Pa. or phone 717-768-3139." Elmer was one of the Zimmerman's who operated the hardware store in Intercourse. The "717" phone area tells us the card was published after 1947\*. Limeville was never allotted a Post Office.

\*The area code system, developed by AT&T and Bell Labs in the 1940's, went into effect in 1947. States and Can. provinces with a single area code were assigned three digit codes with 0 as the middle number: 203 for CN., 305 for FL. States with more than one area code were given three digit codes with 1 as the middle number: 916 and 213 for sections of CA; 212 and 518 for sections of NY. First and third digits were allotted according to population density. Most populated areas got the lowest numbers: NYC has 212, while NYC suburbs have 914, the rationale - phones (rotary dials back then) allowed more people the least "work" to call.



South of Christiana (another metropolis bi-passed) is the village of **Nine Points**, which far out-numbers its counterpoint to the north, Fivepointville, with its number of intersecting roads. In lieu of a PC for Nine Points we offer a Trade Card from F. E. Brown & Bro., Dealers in General Mdse. the colorful scene is by the <u>Merrick Thread Co.</u> "The Rhinoceros feels safe to tread his lofty way on Merrick's thread.



Our final Border Town is **Pleasant Grove**, a mere ½ mile north of the Mason-Dixon Line to the south. O. C. Womelsdorff was proprietor of the Black Barren Springs House in Pleasant Grove. Black Barren was a stone's throw north. Railroad directions are included for guests from Phila. and Balt. "Boarding by the day, week or month...the refitted house is on high ground over-looking charming countryside. Black Barren Springs Water is sweet, delicious - invigorating; gentle on liver and bowels; remedy for Bright's disease, diabetes, dropsy and all diseases of the stomach and kidneys." How could you afford to stay away?
