CHRISTMAS TRADITIONS AROUND THE WORLD

Advent, "the coming", is special in Germany, and is marked with calendars, wreaths and the baking of cakes and cookies. Christmas Eve is the climax of German Christmas.

The creche or Nativity scene began in Italy when St. Francis of Assisi helped his followers understand the Christmas story. Gifts are given on several holidays concluding on New Year's Day.

Gifts are left in children's shoes by Père Noël (Father Christmas) in France.A traditional supper follows Midnight Mass.

In Poland Christmas trees are decorated with real fruit and cookies, cut paper and decorated eggs. The celebration culminates in the Wigilia, "vigil", on Christmas Eve.

Netherlands festivities begin Dec. 5

when St. Nicholas drops gifts down chimneys (probably where hanging stockings by the chimney began). The patron saint arrives by boat with Zwarte Piet (Black Peter) dressed as a Moor. Both are greated with great pomp.

Nisse, a little man known only to cats and cattle, lives in barns all year round but is given a Christmas Eve meal by every Scandanavian family. He appears on most all Christmas postcards from northern Europe.


In Switzerland Father Christmas marches up and down city streets giving boys gifts while his wife Lucy shares Christmas joy with little girls.

Las Posadas, "the lodging" begins Dec.19 in Mexico. Processions of children representing Mary, Joseph, angels and the magi sing carols and carry candles through the streets. The children's shoes are filled on Epiphany.

In British Canada traditions follow those of England: plum pudding, yule logs, the first Christmas postcards and "mumming" (dressing in costumes to pay holiday calls)

Ukranians and many eastern Europeans eat no meat in honor of Christ's birth for six weeks before Ukranian Christmas, Jan.7. Then the children look for the first star of the night and run inside for a great Christmas Eve meal.

In Moravian communities around the world, sacred carols and baskets of buns and hot beverages highlight their "Love Feast" on Christmas Eve.






