

Many of our Club members are beginners. They haven't inherited an album of old PCs from their grandparents. They haven't found a shoebox full among 'throw-outs' in the closet. Starting with CHROME POSTCARDS could be their answer. And certainly chromes are in abundance - at garage sales, etc. - the chromes of local Amish life.

Native Lancastrians take AMISH CARDS for granted. We've grown up with the few pre-1920 and real photo Amish cards; hundreds of Amish linen and white-border cards and now seemingly thousands of different 'chromes' produced in 'hoards' since the '50's.

WHY START NOW?

Here's why - with the continental size PCs (4x6") everywhere you look, this may be the time to search out what remain of the standard size($3\frac{1}{2}x5\frac{1}{2}$ ")chromes while they're still plentiful.

What you can find for 5, 10 and 25¢ in our County are being touted for 50¢ to \$2 in the midwest and farwest. This is noted not for investment purposes, but to remind you that what you take for granted is not so common elsewhere.

WHAT METHOD DO I USE TO COLLECT?

How you collect is up to you. Most Amish chromes are numbered by the publishers. This is one way. You may find the subjects by a particular publisher are more to your liking.

Or you could collect by subject matter: barn-raisings; at markets; field work; children at school or play; riding buggies; at worship or auction sales; interiors.




Baarfiessiche Buwe (barefoot boys).

PRINTERS AND PUBLISHERS

A survey of 312 chrome postcards, dating from the 1940's through the 1980's and relating to the Amish reveal the following: COLOURPICTURE PUBLISHERS, INC., Boston = 28 H.S.CROCKER, INC., Phila. & N.Y.C. = 10 CURT TEICH & CO., Chicago = 13 DEXTER PRESS, INC., Pearl R. & W.Nyack NY=106 KOPPEL COLOR CARDS, Hawthorne, N.J. = 79 TICHNOR BROS., Chicago = 35 TOMELIN ART CO., Northport, N.Y. = 41

Of these, the lion's share(212) were produced for local publishers STEL-MAR and JAS. HESS by DEXTER and KOPPEL. MEL HORST and L.E.SMITH are two other local publishers.



All of the above PCs are standard size, full color. Most current cards available are produced in **continental size** (a distraction to many collectors). However, one set of 36(retail 20¢) are **exceptional black** and white photos and feature Amish children.







ON THE SUBJECT OF EXPLOITATION

A Club member never felt she should exploit her Amish neighbors, so she didn't collect Amish PCs. Her friend brought postcards to her garage sale and both LCPC members were amazed (and pleased) to find one Amish neighbor and her daughters pore over PCs, especially the Amish cards, with giggles and titters and much fun. They were looking for people they knew.

After a half hour the Amish mother purchased nearly 60 cards (20-25¢ ea.) She intended 'to keep them, not use them'.

THE AMISH BELIEF

"You shall not make for yourself a graven image or a likeness of anything"(Exod.20:4) Applying photographs to 'likenesses', their aversion to photography is a way of suppressing pride. Seeing themselves in a picture, they might begin to take themselves too seriously. They might think'that they are somebody'.So the taboo suppresses individualism and cultivates **GELASSENHEIT**

Gelassenheit is abstract, but can mean to an Amishman:self-surrender, yielding to God and others, self-denial, and contentment. More precisely: obedience, thrift, simplicity and humility. Especially humility.

Perhaps Amish children appear more often in photos and on cards because they haven't yet taken the strict baptismal vows. In any case, it is inappropriate to persuade them.

INTERESTING LOCAL AMISH POSTCARDS

There appears a series The Pennsylvania Dutch, under the name Yorkcraft Pa. Dutch Post Cards (York, PA) consisting of quaint customs and expressions, illustrated.

The hand-drawn, full-color pictures divide the cards into three groups. Known examples are listed.

GROUP I - Pictures have white background; a matte finish stock; "place one cent stamp here"; cancellations seen are 1949,1951.

PC2, PC3, PC5, PC6

GROUP II - Pictures(similar to Group I)have solid colored backgrounds; matte finish stock; "place postage stamp here"; cancellations seen are 1954,1961.

PCl through PC6

GROUP III - Entirely different pictures; no printing on front; glossy surface similar to chromes; "place postage here".

PC8, PC9, PC10 are views


PCll through PCl4 are individuals More information is requested in regards to the number of cards in the series as well as concerning the producer - YORKCRAFT.

DEMUTH PAINTINGS AVAILABLE ON POSTCARDS


Chas.Demuth was born in Lancaster, PA., at 109 N. Lime St., the only child of Ferdinand and Augusta Demuth on Nov. 8,1883.


In 1889 the family moved to 118 E. King St.next to the family's colonial to-bacco shop (the oldest one in America). He studied china painting with Miss Letty Purple in 1900.

He was in Paris by way of Franklin & Marshall Academy, Drexel Inst.and The Phila. Academy of FineArts by 1904. Here he became part of the vanguard of Am. artists that soon broughtToulouse-Lautrec's posters, Picasso's cubism and Duchamp dadaism to our country.



Phila. and New Hope, along with bohemian living in these same cities as well as Provincetown, MA., occupied his life for the next ten years.

Severe diabetes brought Charles back to Lancaster for a prolonged stay. (He visited with his mother on an irregular basis.)

These long stays at home produced many cubisttype renditions of local buildings. The Colonial Theatre provided subjects from vaudeville.

Exhibits in prominent galleries continued. Poor health in 1934 brought him back home. He died Oct.23,1935, survived by his mother, Augusta Demuth.


