

Member #63 finds #1 PAID REPLY POSTAL CARD

Members #62 and #63, Ruth and Harold Moyer are great sales attendees. "Rootin'through" some old sales purchases, Harold rediscovered this first US Paid Reply Postal Card with both Message and Reply halves attached


A find in itself, this postal card has local significance because it ties in so well with many postcard views of the Theological Seminary on W.James St., Lancaster.

The printed message is self-explanatory. But for many of us who've seen Seminary PCs with no trees or newly planted trees it explains why the building was such a popular

PC subject in the early 1900's.

Our collecting cousins, the philatelists, would call this Scott #UYl consisting of two halves, each with the US Grant imprint stamp, one identified as Message Card One Cent, the other Reply Card One Cent. The Moyer pair was mailed to Rev. W.H.Groh(?) at Carlisle, Pa. and cancelled May (?), 1893 Lancaster PA.Obviously the Reverend did not reply with the card. Did he "crash the party" and attend unannounced?

Harold's specimen is in super fine condition but he says it's not for sale. Early(undivided back) #2686 black and white postcard by National Art Views Co., N.Y. City







Perhaps not, as it is still in its infancy; but being an extremely healthy baby, it is rapidly growing to be a big boy.

This is one of a set of 10 "Conundrum Post Cards," which we are introducing on the market. All who have handled it predict a "big run." We have tested its selling qualities and find that if given a good "show-window" display, the public clamor for it.

These cards are on sale at \$15 per thousand by the American News Company, 39 Chambers Street, New York. If you are inclined to feel skeptical, send for a trial order only at first. We know you will want more later, as this card, by its phenomenal attractiveness, serves as a wonderful medium for advertising the whole store wherever it is displayed.

By 1906 manufacturers of postcards had nearly exhausted every possible manner of selling their wares. Certainly 'novelty' was a field opened to their imaginations.

Dederick Brothers of Hackensack NJ excelled in the TILT-MESSAGE variety. On a 1906 PC their dealer ad reads in part "Have you seen the latest thing in Post Cards?...This is one of a set of 10 'Conundrum Post Cards' which we are introducing on the market...."

They were available at \$15 per 1,000 by American News Co. of New York(the printer). Trial orders were available.

A 1907 card now offered a set of 20 Conundrum Post Cards, this time emphasizing the quality of the card stock and available at only \$10 per 1,000(again from Am.News.Co.).


Often the subject dealt with romance. The full-color unsigned art work is above average.

The unique feature of these postcards is the answer which appears on the face of the card along with the question and a related picture. However the answer (in letters an inch high) is not discernible! Why? Because the elongated letters were pinched! Twenty one letters to an inch - 1" high!

The solution?

Tilting the card on nearly a flat plane directly in line with the bridge of your nose provides the answer. It takes practice, but the answer can be read. The answers are generally absurd and those who can't stand puns need not look for these unusual cards.

Admittedly, many are very sexist - but remember the time was 1906 and 1907. It's ob-



vious the Dederick Bros. - or their writers were either 'girl-crazy' or sought that audience. Puns were at their height (or depth) as well.

THE GRAND OLD SYCAMORE

"On another walk, on another day...my sister Helen and I.. journeyed up the railroad tracks to the Grant Noll farm. We wanted to see the Big Tree.

"Standing aloof from the farmhouse, yet shading all, the tree's huge size and majestic appearance dominated the whole of the landscape" so C.E. Snavely recalls of his childhood near Rohrerstown. His book Sandblasters Story* is his Journey through the 20th Century. Snavely's 1992 endeavor at the age of 87(!) is a personal presentation to his grandchildren and an inspiration to those who can relate to old Lanc. County.


"As we looked further, we saw the tree was firmly rooted in a rocky bed and freely nourished by a nearby spring. We now knew why the tree had grown so big. The Big Tree's best friend babbled the secret!

"In addition to its huge size, the tree had another remarkable feature. One of its limbs (see postcard) branched out from the mighty trunk in a lateral fashion, barely 6' above the ground and continued on at that height, more or less for a distance of 84'!

"Mr. Noll...gently placed me up among the leafy foliage. Even though I was sitting near its very end, more than 60 feet from the trunk...".

Pa.Trees by Jos.Illick, 1925: The most massive sycamore in the State stands about 4 miles w. of Lancaster...measures over 27 feet in circumference at the ground and at 5 feet from the ground is over 22 feet in circumference. It is 102 feet high and has a branch spread of 138 feet.
