### GENUINE TURKEYS


In the days of the first Thanksgiving, Thomas Morton of Massachusetts wrote "turkies there are, which divers times in great flocks have sallied by our doores; and then a gunne, being commonly in a rediness, salutes them with such courtesie, as makes them take a turne in the Cooke room."

Collecting turkeys on Thanksgiving PCs is of major interest to some collectors and marginal for many, many more. Maybe it's the extra big, fancy Thanksgiving PC turkey that attracts attention. Maybe it's that same unnatural Thanksgiving turkey that drives the rest of us away.

The two postcard turkeys in our story this month are only paintings, but perhaps they're closer to the real bird.

The Audubon Society Field Guide to North American Birds (Eastern Region) reads-

"No bird is more distinctly American than the Wild Turkey. The species was even suggested as our national bird by Benjamin Franklin, who pointed out that the Bald Eagle is principally a carrion feeder.

"For a time, intense hunting seemed to drive the Turkey into extinction, but with habitat management, controlled hunting seasons and careful reintroductions, it has again become fairly common in many parts of its former range.

"Although fairly well known to the American Indians and widely used by them as food, certain tribes considered these birds stupid and cowardly and did not eat them for fear of acquiring these characteristics.

"Turkeys often roost over water because of the added protection that this offers. They are polygamous, and the male gobbles and struts with fanned tail to attract and hold his harem. They are swift runners."


And so, like Hollywood, most postcard publishers and 99% of their artists, choose to show us what they think is important.

"I recently purchased an interesting group of PCs published by Architectural Post Card Co. of Phila. They were printed in Germany c.1910 and are in b/w. There are at least 8 series. I have examples from series #3,4,and 8 (probably 12 PCs each series but this is a guess). I have 11 in series #3.

"What makes this series unusual is that they show architectural features- interior and exterior- of wealthy new homes in and around Phila. These are houses built by the leading architects of the day and they are listed on the PCs. I have not seen a set like this showing contemporary architecture from any other area of the country.

## BIRTHDAY POSTCARD SURPRISE INVITATIONS

"Dear Friend,

Received your card. Thank you ever so much for it. Received 168..." The friend was Miss Mabel Wade. The writer was Zillah A.Leaman. The picture postcard was unstamped (probably mailed in an envelope). The view was the Lancaster County Prison and Grounds and in the sky was written "This is about two squares from my home. So must be good. "Research finds Zillah lived at 55 Clark St. (just east of N. Broad) and she was a corkmaker (the Lancaster Cork Works was about 6 blocks north on New Holland Ave.).

Can we believe Zillah wrote a Thank You postcard to each of her 168 contributors??? If so, it's little wonder postcards comprised so much of the pre-1907 mail.(Pre-1907?..it was a Leighton Co. #2367 undivided back).

Mabel Wade (Strasburg RFD l on a second PC) received another card from Zillah, cancelled May 18,1910 on Valentine & Sons #403,769 North Duke Street Lancaster. "Thanks for birthday card. How did you know when my birthday was?" (ED.note-Did she forget Mabel sent one before?) "I got 19 cards and six presents. Let me know when yours and Myrtle's birthdays are. Zillah."

Birthday postcards were often local views - especially if the recipient was a known PC collector! In the 5,000 LANCASTER CITY POSTCARDS were the following Birthday Postcard Surprise invitations:



One other card must not be overlooked. To Mame Fahnstock, 433 Lehman St., Lebanon it was mis-addressed to Boyertown and reads "They want to surprise MAGGIE McCOnnell, and so want to give her a leather postal surprise on Saturday the 17th (Aug.1907). They don't know I'm writing to you.

Some postcard clubs publish their members' birthdays on a monthly basis. This could be fun for those who like corresponding. Of course, year dates should be ommitted!








Soutter, Buchanan & Young PC cancelled 8/15/07 reads:
"They want to surprise Magie McConnell, and so want to give her a leather postal (sic) surprise on Saturday the 17th. They don't know I'm writing to you..."
(Of course, we know the writer should have said post not postal as it's not a government issued card.)

Unlike any of the postcards referred to in the article, this postcard surprise request is over-printed on a b/w multi-view of Iancaster scenes. The received cancellation on the front is Strasburg, Oct.1,1907, four days before the big event. Should we assume it was a birthday? It is addressed to Martin Weaver, Strasburg, Pa. and mailed from Lampeter.


Pit Brow Girls 3 Divided back card marked Will Smith's Series. Wigan. Made in Germany.

#1 "This is(a)typical picture of the girls working outside the pit or coal mines in Lancashire, Eng. I was last week with one of our shows at that town where they work at the pit. They are sorting the coal from the stones and that's how they dress when at work. I think the law ought to stop it as it is a civilize(d) country, for women to work at the coal mine. Well, by, by(sic) "Half Moon"

In sorting through postcards for my September slide presentation I remembered this group of three. It was in the handmade category because one card had a beautifully inked Indian on the address side. I would like to believe it to be a self-portrait of Half Moon himself.


As the messages suggest, Half Moon was on a tour (Western cowboy and Indian shows were typical tour attractions in England and on the Continent prior to World War I).

Even more important to some collectors, including our recent member #288, Andreas Brown, is the social implication of mining conditions as noted by Half Moon. The irony is that Half Moon and other native born Americans were gradually losing their own society. Indian reservations do little to maintain the integrity of their history or social structure.


