
For hats just as funny, but not on a bunny, turn to LADIES' GIGANTIC HATS inside. Postcard by Whitney, Worcester, Mass.



In the interest of Fashion we offer this scarce look into two WATT and SHAND DEPARTMENT STORE windows prior to World War I. A magnifier, however, reveals the sign reads "Autumn Fashion Show". Sorry, but we haven't found an Easter Show postcard.

A SET OF 20 ANOMALIES

THE CARD rarely recommends. Here it does!



In the March 1990 issue we explained a difference: postal cards are printed with a postage stamp by a governmental agency. Postcards/post cards are privately printed, generally with a picture on one side, space for message, address and stamp on the other.

And then we confused ourselves by proclaiming that the USPS had, in late 1989, issued two postal cards each with a picture on one side and the same view as its own stamp on the address side! Anomalies on a federal scale! The examples were the White House and the Jefferson Memorial. We called them pictorial postal cards.

Recently Polly Curtis showed us the USPS issues of LEGENDS OF THE WEST stamps and PCs displayed in an elegant album. Your editor's ears perked, mostly at the picture postal cards.

I sent for them - 20 full color standard sized cards with identical printed stamps. The set is \$7.95 postpaid - a good buy when you consider 19¢ for stamp,21¢ for postcard (40¢ x 20 cards = \$8.00) If you use them, you must add 1¢ postage (1993 issues).

Ask for item #9926 Legends *Post Card Set Enclose check for \$7.95 per set of 20 PCs. Write: USPS, Philatelic Sales Division, Kansas City,MO 64144.Delivery took four weeks(even with a USPS money order).


We loved her. We'll miss her.



Our Illustrations

Above illus. American News Co. #A2029 is an excellent b/w view showing the W&S building when it occupied only the E.King St. corner of Square's SE corner. Trolley tracks are conspicuous in the Belgian-bricked street. Next page, top- Metropolitan News Co. #1784, as nice as the Am. News b/w but more in demand since it shows the very collectible 4-story brick Royers Whiskey bldg. Center-Ike Steinfeldt's white border PC, Teich #2949-29,also popular with nostalgic yellow Birney trolleys. Bottom-The only W&S linen we've seen, MWM's #13,233F shows the bldg.extended onto S.Queen St., as on center PC. It advertises the store's 78th Anniversary Sale - Feb.28 thru Mar.10(1956) on reverse.

A glance at our check-list (next page) will attest to the fact that WATT & SHAND was the most photographed store on the Square as well as the entire city.

The Lancaster Board of Trade (predecessor to The Chamber of Commerce) in its 1909 Resources and Industries of Lancaster, Pa. said "Standing conspicuously in the front ranks of mercantile institutions is the New York Store, of which the firm of Watt & Shand are proprietors. This store, or, more accurately speaking, these stores, for there are in reality more than a dozen stores contained in this mammoth building, serves as a drawing card for not only all the population of this city, but for the residents of rural districts for many miles around."

Our gallery of postcards traces growth of the building as it enveloped the southeast corner of Center (later Penn) Square.

Discount stores, shopping malls and certainly the influence of cars could not have been imagined by P.T.Watt and James Shand when they opened their 1878 store with Mr. Thompson, a partner who died two yrs.later.

For most natives, purchase of the store just a few years ago by an out-of-town firm, The Bon Ton, was the handwriting on the wall. March 4,1995 was the store's last day of business. It's future? Branch college or offices on the upper floors and retail shops or offices on ground level are feasible options. Certainly the wrecker's ball is NOT in the future for this Grand Dame.

WATT & SHAND POSTCARDS

All are undivided backs of Lancaster views, published by the store, marked "Germany" by an unidentified printer (illus.). These are excellent colored lithographic scenes and are in every way comparable to Rotograph and American News Co. quality.






imagine the additional difficulties for car manufacturers?






