



Our background photo is the Wabank Bridge which blew apart in a violent storm and was abandoned in 1957. It collapsed from neglect in 1969, something that would never happen today since a regular crew hired by Lancaster County works fulltime keeping our local covered bridges in very good condition.



The covered bridges on the previous page are, top to bottom: at S.Lancaster, New Hampshire (Koppel 39259); an Eastern Illustrating Co. real photo #43 at Lancaster, NH, over the Conn.River and Koppels 63076 showing the Rock Mill Bridge near Lancaster, Ohio. A belated April Fool joke from your staff! They are Lancaster bridges! But the b/w card above described as "Lancaster County, Pa." is an error by publisher C. Seeman of Phila, Pa., since it's definitely the much-photographed covered bridge at Valley Forge..an error, NOT an April Fool!

LEGENDS make a fun postcard collection. We present a collection of DOGWOOD LEGENDS. Reading clockwise from the top:

A.Continental chrome 2USTN14B by John Hinde Curteich, Inc. for Tennessee PC Co. features the newest strain of red dogwood blossoms. B.Koppel's 159372 chrome for Valley Views, a Virginia firm, "native tree of the region" also features its state bird, the cardinal. C. Colourpicture's SK5496 chrome for Atlantic News Agency. The Georgia firm features rows of dogwood trees.A 1959 postmark predates extensive damage now suffered due to excess sulfur dioxide in the eastern forest. D.Dexter's DT8488C chrome, also red flowers. E. A linen for Asheville PC Co. by Tichnor, 88689 is pale blue framed by white flowers. F. A brilliant green chrome sets off these white blossoms on Koppel's KB908 for Valley

Views of Powhatan, Virginia. G.A second Dexter, DT28069B, w/white flowers. H.Curt Teich's linen 197.F is part of their Florida Series.A huge blossom is surrounded by a grove of pink and white trees.

I. Our second continental chrome has a scalloped border by an unknown printer. Numbered MPC120309 for Mayer PC Co., Chesterfield.VA., it features large white blossoms.



Thomas, Cambridge, MA. or Metrocraft, Everett, MA.


Even if you can't be there to help, remind your friends and relatives to stop by and see the exhibit (nearly 70 boards).

This is a good opportunity to 'talk cards' to the Public. Your enthusiasm will bring them to our meetings and to the Expo.


We'll man the exhibit until Park City closes, then the Breakdown Crew takes over.




Anne Valsing's 1995 NPW entry.





The sojourns included a correction of Lawrenceville to Lawrenceburg, three handstamped "forewarded" and eight crossouts!


As there is no return address, we must suppose the card got to its intended recipient who evidently was back in Washington DC from whence it was mailed!

KINPORTS CIGAR FACTORY POSTCARD MIS-LABELED!

The postcard shown above, published by A.E.Lane sometime before 1907, shows a building labeled as being in the village of Clay. It has been definitely identified as the textile mill presently in operation in Hopeland. Why is it mis-labeled? Are there more Lane cards mis-labeled? Are there more postcards throughout Lancaster County incorrectly identified?

THE CARD staff felt its responsibility to get to the root of what could be a heinous crime perpetrated not only on today's card collectors but on the millions of innocent citizens of our Garden Spot who might have been misled for nearly a cenury. A series of interviews was scheduled. Police accompaniment was considered.

HOW WAS THE DISCOVERY MADE?

We will begin at the beginning. Your editor was invited to speak before the Brick-erville Leisure Hours Club. His HTL show was supplemented with local views, including the villages of Brickerville, Clay and Hopeland.

Almost at once these senior but alert citizens noted the discrepency on the above illustrated card. The response was unanimous. The factory was and still is in Hopeland, NOT Clay. (Please note these folks were extremely helpful, also, in identifying members of the Hopeland baseball team as well as members of Schuyler Mellinger's Melody Makers hillbilly band from Clay.

THE INTERVIEWS

The publisher, Abe Lane of Clay, seemed the most likely candidate.

CARD: Mr.Lane, as publisher of this postcard can you explain its incorrect caption?

ABE L.:To tell you the truth Sonny, my general store, bein' the only one for miles along here, I git people stoppin' and wantin' souvenirs or we use 'em to get hold of our relatives. No phone, yet, yah know. It's a nice little place, Clay.

CARD: True, but this factory is a mile down Clay Road in Hopeland.

ABE L.: Yep. Anyhow Johnnie Zook, in Lititz by the Express shop said the price was a heap cheaper if I took 4,000. Meant four cards. Better go see him.

CARD: Mr. Zook, as owner and man in charge of printing, don't you feel responsible for this mis-label on Abe Lane's postcard?

JOHN Z.:Lookie here, Sonny Jim. I don't just

JOHN Z.:Lookie here, Sonny Jim. I don't just make cards for Abe. I print thousands of these little critters every week. Fer him, fer me and fer maybe nearly 50 more would-be millionaires in the County. They all got businesses or post offices. They all want cards, 'cause they sell so dern good. Why I even been mailin' 'em outta County! I can't track down evry dog-gone picture. Gotta rely on them would-be millionaires to git the info and picture to me.

CARD: Yes, but don't you feel just a little responsible for this glaring error? After all, both villages are only a half hour's drive - if you stay on the good road.

JOHN Z.:OK, maybe a little. But shucks he'dda been all over me like a wet dish rag if I'd charged him 'fer 3,000 and he coulddah had another 1,000 for \$5. So I wrote 'im, "Abe, send me another picture. Make REAL money."

Ya know Sonny Jim, we gotta keep this press goin' six days a week to make it pay fer itself. What with the Big Boys from New York 'n Philly sellin' at big discounts. Anyhow, 'cept fer a few dandies I snapped myself, 'most all'll be in the trash in a couple 'a years. Tell me, how many people know Hopeland 'n Clay are a mile apart? Fact is, how many know where Hopeland is?

'Kin yah keep a secret? CARD: Sure.

JOHN ZOOK: Every notice, I don't put my name on all them cards I print? Even have about four 'er five different backs. That's Our secret. Mind now.

REALITY

The fictional interviews we just played out for you may not be too far from the truth. But the fact is, although there MAY BE ERRORS on postcards, for the MILLIONS OF POSTCARDS PRODUCED - views and greetings, there is only a minute fraction of errors.
