





Railroad enthusiasts will gather in the capitol rotunda

Pennsylvania Railroad Sesquicentennial



at Harrisburg on April 13 to celebrate the 150th Birthday of the Pennsylvania Railroad. The charter authorized the construction of a RR line from Harrisburg to Pittsburgh. The system eventually connected NY with Chicago and St.Louis,

employing 280,000 people. This Curt Teich linen was ordered by I. Steinfeldt, Nov. 11,1938. The large clock on the roofline will be rededicated Apr.17. It was recently restored by the Nat'l. Railway Historical Society.Lancaster Chapter

Below, a full-color white border chrome by Am. Colortype, Chicago and NY.One in a series, it represents the 1953 PRR calendar from a 1952 painting by Grif Teller.Bill Seigford, member #48, says PRR calendars date from 1925 to 1960 and there is a PC of each, some of the earlier ones in b/w.









The scene is a painting by Grif Teller, reknowned for his outstanding calendar work and contracted for by the PRR. (In Nov.1992 LCPC was honored with a program featuring calendars and original art.)

In the foreground on the main line of the PRR between NY and St.Louis a westbound freight passes an eastbound passenger train. On the left, an ore train, across the Ohio River a trainload of coal moving to the great steel mills.

ANGELS

ngels have been around since man could think, at least since he needed an order in his thinking. These supernatural beings who acted as intermediaries between God and man are found in Christian, Islamic and Jewish mythology.

The Old Testament angels multiplied so rapidly that by New Testament time some kind of order was needed.

By the fifth century we have heavenly hosts in as many as nine orders! Simply stated seraphim, cherubim and thrones are in the first circle; dominions, virtues and powers in the second circle and principalities, archangels and angels in the third circle.



Angels first appear in Christian art as young men without wings but by the 4th century have gained long hair and flowing robes, then halos. Old Testament angels have no wings (a "fact" Rembrandt and Dante Rossetti remember in some of their paintings).

Islamic art never depicts angels but Persian art, when it treats Islamic themes, shows them as delicate creatures with multicolored wings.



Stengel #29874. The Rape of Europa was painted in 1576 by Paolo Veronese. Angels appear throughout the work, in the trees, along the shore and above the ocean.

STENGEL #19000 and #29000 Series Markings

The famous German firm with works in Dresden and Berlin printed for the British market through publisher MISCH & CO., LITD. as well as the American market through the publishing firm, THE ROTOGRAPH COMPANY. PCs with the British or American logos are as genuinely Stengel as those solely marked STENGEL. So called "purists" who wish 'only the Stengel cards' show their ignorance.



Archangels. Michael, Raphael, Gabriel, Uriel, Chamuel, Zophiel and Zadkiel are mentioned in the Old Testament. Archangels Michael, Gabriel, Azazel and Israfel are from Islamic sources.

Classical Art on Stengel PCs doesn't differentiate archangels from angels.

Cherubim are spirits in service, guardians, rather than messengers from God. Cherubim were once depicted as beautiful men. By medieval times they were portrayed as chubby-faced babies w/wings, hence their profusion in the classical art shown on these PCs by Stengel. Cherubim is plural, Cherub is the singular form.

Seraphim at the throne of God are described by Isaiah"each one had six wings; with twain he covered his face and with twain he covered his feet and with twain he did fly". Stengel art cards show no Seraphim with six wings.




If you haven't visited a quality "gallery" of Stengel postcards do it soon. If you are familiar with the beautiful lithography you know why, when most PCs sold for a penny, these masterpieces were a dime.


And even if angels (which have reached an apex in popularity) aren't your bag, examine Stengel for other gorgeous beauties, most of them printed with as many as twenty-two tints! Expensive today? Hardly. Hundreds are available for under \$3.

I droped some postal cards in the mail Box at Quarryville & forgot to place stamps on cards(.) will you be so kind as to do so(.) inquire about cards without stamps. from O.W.Lewis(.) will send you money by mail for cards.

To: Miss Malessa Keperling, Millersville, Pa. R.F.D. No.1, Lancaster Co., Penn. Postmarked: Gap., Pa., Jan. 21, 1919
Dear Malessa,

I thought I would write you a few lines to let you know that I got your letter. It went to Kinzer first so put Gap Pa.RFD No.1 Water Loo Smith Shop. You said you got a green dress trimed in green silk and I got a green dress trimed in White Satin.We sold our horse.I gess that will Be all for the time.Some writting.Good-By,Dorothy C.Reese.

To:Miss Anna Good, 31 Diller Ave., New Holland, Pa., Postmarked: Lanc., Pa., Aug. 6, 1920. Dear Anna,

I have no l cent stamp. (She used a 2¢.) I received your letters alright. I do not know when I will be home tomorrow. I hope it does not rain for I have no umbrella.

Kathryn Good. it is 6:30 I just got up.

To:Frederic Littlehale, So. Hanover, Mass. Postmarked: Washington D.C., * May 22,1933. Dear Frederic,

We saw Washington Monument this morning & also saw them making money & postage stamps. We will tell you all about it when we get home. Love, Dad.*(Postcard scene was Science Bldg.,F & M. Was Lancaster on their tour south to DC?)
