


Of course there are others whose formal education or perhaps family cultural training tells them immediately "Why that's the Erlking. I never expected to see it on a post-card!"


And so it is with the subject of this article. I owned it and didn't know what it meant until Jim Rudisill happened by, recognized it and shared with us the words

from his Franz Schubert song book.

The artist name is there - Edmund Brüning (obscure to this writer). But the poet/author responsible for the poem behind this curious painting is anything but obscure - Johann Wolfgang von Goethe (1749-1832).

The Britannica calls Goethe "one of the giants of literature" and you can read more about this Renaissance man for yourself. Suffice to say his versatility of mind and output of energy was nothing short of phenominal.

The Erlking/Elfking was written in his later years. Read it and add a pearl of culture to your life...and don't pass up an unusual postcard simply because you don't understand it...especially if it's cheap.

"My father, my father! And wilt thou not look


On Erlking's daughters in yon dark nook?"

There are surely more cards in this set - at least one, possibly three, maybe more. Look carefully, perhaps you can uncover them. They have undivided backs with seven multi-linqual lines spelling out "post card" and "postal union". The monogram ASB for A.S.Co., Berlin is in the lower left corner along with "Serie 54". Unfortunately they are on poor stock and damage easily.

THE APOSTOLIC CLOCK Danner Collection, Hershey Museum



We've seen this card by Madciff of Hershey, PA. and others like it. Most of us know who the Apostles were.

The details of the Apostolic Clock were uncovered recently by Harold Moyer and after you've read them you'll understand why this amazing workmanship finds a place of honor in the Hershey Museum.

The clock was made by John Fiester, a Lancaster County native in 1878. He was 32 years old. It took him eleven years to complete.

The clock consists of three sections.

The lower section houses a music box which plays upon the appearance of the trumpeters at the time of the Apostles' procession in the upper section.

The middle section contains the face and shows seconds through months plus the Zodiac and moon phases. Childhood appears on the approach of the first quarter of the hour. Father Time's scythe strikes one. On the second quarter hour Youth appears and FT strikes two. On the third quarter hour Middle Age appears, FT strikes three and the Apostles' procession before Christ begins, the music box plays a selection. On the fourth quarter Old Age appears, Father Time strikes four and a skeleton (Death) strikes the hour.

In the upper section the procession of the Deciples occurs at the approach of Middle Age, depicting the betrayal of Christ. As this procession begins, the Apostles parade, face Christ who raises his arms as if to bless them. The three Virgins appear at the top center

observing the procession.

NOTE - this covers, in detail, the part of the LH with which we're most familiar - ten chapters covering just PA. Chapter 3 is Downingtown to Lancaster and Ch. 4, Lancaster to York.

Bernie has MANY ALBUMS of LH cards and you'll find at least 16 great postcards of his in the book along with hundreds of other PCs and very nice photos from the PA. State Archives, Department of Highways.

I was tired after a long day including the April meeting/program but I spent another two hours that night just enjoying pictures and I hadn't seen them all!Over 300 pages, more than 300 b/w pics(PCs are reduced only 30%) well-documented with current and obsolete businesses and attractions and Bernie can save you a couple of dollars from the retail price which is \$16.95 plus tax. PARTLY PERSONAL Amish Postcards in Demand

The Museum of Art in Lexington, MA. needed Amish postcards, especially old ones, to emphasize the length of time this sect has been attracting tourists. Cathie Zusy, the museum's rep. contacted me by phone and after a lengthy conversation I sent her fifty-five PCs from which to choose. She had been referred to me by Donald Kraybill whom many of you know.

Two days later a young graduate of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill spent four hours at my home choosing views to complete a thesis on The Fascination of the Amish in American Culture. David Zercher has a year-long grant through the university's Dept. of Religious Studies for this research. He has been living in New Holland. From this Lancaster County base he studies all types of media and finds that postcards are one of the earliest forms of portraying Amish life.

He was impressed by the extensive card collection at the Mennonite Information Center. (From the few different ones I had, I'm equally impressed.) With a lap-top computer he took notes and then made copies of Amish PCs from my collection.

David will soon be teaching at Messiah College, Grantham, in Cumberland County.

PEQUEA #101 A Primer of the Two Pequeas

(PEQUEA = peck way)

Is Your Post Card PEQUEA EAST or PEQUEA WEST? Post Office Cancellations are Positive Proof.


The Pequea Creek is the cause of it all. It crosses Lanc. County from east to west. The eastern Pequea lay by its headwaters near the Chester Co.line. The western Pequea is at its mouth on the Susquehanna River, the County's western border.




A common card of the Salisbury Twp. Pequea is the White Horse High School (left) and this community eventually became known as White Horse. Several churches, businesses and the Pequea Valley School District are reminders of this eastern Pequea community.

Enter the U.S. Post Office Department and a basic rule: there shall be no duplication of a Post Office name within a said State.







ANY POSTCARD WITH A PEQUEA CANCELLATION BETWEEN 1843 AND Sept.30,1913 IS THIS EARLIER/EASTERN TOWN. By comparison, there are far fewer PCs of the Salisbury Twp. Pequea.In fact there are only a few: schools, mills and churches. We will offer a checklist in a future issue.




