

An unusual Hallowe'en set - the subjects were photographed in a studio setting the card then reproduced in full color



# POSTCARD STAMPS Local PCs May Contain Smallest Views

A curiosity in some local collections is a postcard published by Ess an Ess (sic) Photo Co Inc with a tiny photo view. It's approximately  $1\frac{1}{4}$ "x 3/4" and surrounded by perforations and looking exactly like a postage stamp (the size of many commemoratives).

Even to an old pro like **Charlie Griffiths**, it was a curiosity. For many years he had only one. It was captioned STOCK EXCHANGE HOTEL, MOUNTVILLE, PA. and included the copy-



A few years ago I found one of the RESER-VOIR, MASONIC HOMES, ELIZABETHTOWN, PA. including "Go, little card and carry to my friend A wish for Birthday blessings without end".

While the Mountville PC had the publisher name along the front lower right margin, the E-town card had a it on the reverse left edge and reads The Ess an Ess Photo Co., ll E. 17th St., New York, N.Y. It's cancelled from Elizabethtown, PA. March 6. 1922 and mailed to Middletown, PA.



"Another birthday soon as this? Well, then, accept a birthday kiss With wishes for a happy year From one who holds you very dear." "As ships pass greetings Out at sea, Here's just a line To you from me." "As the flower is the brighter And the fairer for the dew So my life has been the sweeter Just because of knowing you. "(vert.) "Don't wait until your ship comes in before you write. Just send a penny postal card to me tonight." "If your ink-well is dry and you haven't a pen, And your stock of notepaper is ended, Just send me a card as a sign of regard, Or it may be I'll soon get offended."

"I'm dreadfully lonesome When you are away So lonesome there seems A whole week in a day So please to return Without further delay."(vert.) "In token of the friendship Which exists between us two This friendly message post card Is sent from me to you."(vert.) "May all the things you wish for most Be yours in fullest measure And Birthday joys surround your path And fill your day with pleasure.' "May your future be as cloudless As a sunny summer sky All blessings crowd around you And troubles ne'er come nigh." "To send you good wishes Gives me much pleasure And may they be realized In fullest measure."(vert.) "This sketch is a suggestion Of the fine things I can see As I sit here and write to you I wish you were here with me."

Gerald Hostetter has one captioned BOROUGH SCHOOLS,MT.JOY,PA. It's a unique view to him. It has a M.J.postmark, cancelled Oct.21.1915 to Bertha Kautzman,448 N.Queen St. She was a saleswoman at Hager's Department Store.

Frames around the sentiments vary but suggest a strong 1920's art deco influence.(Illus) They are random as well, and often duplicated.

> CALL FOR OLD POSTAGE STAMPS LCPC will pay you for your stamps

Several mailings this year featured old postage stamps on your monthly CARD envelope. They came from a hoard of old stamps belonging to Gerald Hostetter who has discovered, as have many "old-time"stamp collectors that many stamps have little or no premium above face value. In fact, at auctions and from stamp dealers most old stamps are discounted - actually bought for less than face value in quantity.

You have several choices instead of selling below face, 1) start using them for personal postage by buying the necessary amounts to total 32¢ per letter or 20¢ per postcard OR 2)ask for our blank envelopes (230 at a time) and apply your stamps and be paid by LCPC at face value (200 x 32¢ = \$64). The club uses at least this much each month, plus extra for office use and you may apply as many as you wish, so long as LCPC can pay you as each month's mailing is done.

### HERALDRY 101







It's difficult to avoid heraldry on postcards. But most of us try our best to do just that. As with snakes and spiders, often we dislike them because we don't understand them. And we avoid learning about them so our entire lives have this huge void of ignorance. To most people, heraldry lies in such a void.

Jim Rudisill is a student of history and art. I'm sure it's this combination that has given him a keen interest in heraldry and this article is meant to teach enough so that we no longer avoid the subject but might just give these fascinating designs another look.

The proper description of a coat of arms is conveniently divided into five parts:

THE SHIELD

THE CREST

THE SUPPORTERS

THE HELMET AND ITS MANTLING/LAMBREQUIN

THE MOTTO

(See Faulkner & Co. PC showing Oxford city coat of arms.)

The blazon of a coat of arms is a description so precise that the reader could depict the arms correctly without any other assistance. A typical blazon includes tinctures(color), the charges(pictorial devices) and the crest(ornament surmounting the helmet or crown). This last device was crucial. Knights were easily recognized and therefore not killed by their own men.

Many books lacked color and so a strict formula was designated for printing the seven basic colors:

GOLD (or) - dots


SILVER (argent) - plain
BLUE (azure) - horizontal lines
RED (guls) - perpendicular lines

BLACK (sable) - crossed lines


GREEN (vert) - diagonal up.left-lr.rt.
PURPLE (purpure) - diagonart.-lr.lft.

PURPLE (purpure) - diag.up.rt.-lr.lft.


PROPER refers to a device's natural color.More details involve POINTS(areas) of the shield and its FURS.




Divided back PC by C.W.Faulkner shows City of Oxford, England coat of arms. The SHIELD is an example of a CANTING arms, that is, the CHARGE (the red ox) "sings"/cants the town's name as it crosses/ fords the blue water. The CREST is a crowned lion facing dexter (to the right of the wearer not the observer!) The knight's shredded cape became the MANTLING. On correctly depicted MANTLING it is attached to the helmet by a TORSE. A TORSE shows six twists of the MANTLING's two colors. On high ranking arms of peers and communities SUPPORTERS are often shown on either side of the SHIELD. These may be actual or imaginary animals or humans. The family MOTTOES derive from the battle cries of knighthood and were usually inscribed on a belt or scroll at the base of the shield.



This Oxford example from FSO Heraldic Series of Cathedrals exemplifies an ecclesiastical coat of arms. The bishop's miter is the CREST. Again, the fording ox. The word "SEE" refers to the area of a bishop's diocese.



An excellent undivided PC by Ottmer Zieher of Munich shows the Saxony quartered arms with the CANTING CHARGE, a monk(Mönch/monk) in the sinister chief point (top left). Remember - the wearer's left)



An heraldic card by Ja-Ja publisher, Eng., show the CIVIC coat of arms of Lancashire including three red roses. Besides CIVIC, you can classify coats of arms as PERSONAL, ECCLESIASTICAL and INSTITUTIONAL such as guilds, colleges, military and clubs.


Coat-of-Arms of London, England from a the Ja-Ja Heraldic Series





Official Coat Of Arms Of The Commonwealth Of Pennsylvania



THE ROYAL ARMS OF GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND.



By an unknown publisher this embossed and gilted Royal Arms of Great Britain and Ireland is an example of the royal family's prerogative to having the lion crested crowned helmet facing forward. Helmets of peers could also face forward. Knights, esquires, gentlemen and yeomens' helmets faced dexter(right). A MOTTO appears on the belt around the SHIELD as well as on the scroll. Details on the SHIELD of Canada show the individual provincial shields.

This Plastichrome PC by Gettysburg publisher Dutchcraft Co. shows on the TORSE of the Pennsylvania Coat of Arms the Commonwealth's colors of gold and blue.JR notes that the SUPPORTERS(two handsome steeds) were white until the 1870's. Since then they have always been black. Does someone have an explanation?

Upper left. From the well-known and popular Ja-Ja Heraldic Series issued by Stoddard & Co.,Ltd.,Halifax,England. The coat of arms occupies the entire card (termed a "full-out"). Printed in resplendent colors (here principally red) with gilt and silver they are almost always within a gilt frame of a uniform design. The series is unnumbered and extensive covering practically every town in England, Scotland, Wales and the boroughs of London,together with universities and many associations.

In America there is no such thing as an official registry of arms. In England all arms must be registered, approved and issued from The College of Arms, Queen Victoria Street, London EC4.
