100 Issues of THE CARD

Well,we've made it. It hardly seems that over eight years have gone by since our club and its official monthly bulletin, THE CARD began. Strictly speaking, THE CARD got its name on its second birthday, January 1992. The editor for these eight years will remind you, name or not, it's been a monthly fun game... at least so far.

NOTE: Feb.to Dec.1990 issues are numbered 1 to 11 in Volume #1. Actual count includes the December 1989 letter for a total of 12 issues in this first year. Each succeeding year has twelve monthly issues.

This compendium of all 100 issues, we trust, will serve as a concise index for those seeking reference. Members who've joined in recent years, may wish to check the information at the end of the list for possible back issues you'd like to secure. Note: monthly programs, exhibit competition, numerous small articles and routine club news such as prices realized at club auctions are not included.

Except for the first year, <u>January and June issues</u> are designated for points of reference.

1989-1990

#1_Dec.31.1989 Since we didn't know who we were or if we'd even survive, this first communication (a single page) was an introductory letter on one side and a handlettered flier on the reverse. It was mailed to 11 people and distributed locally. It was printed on yellow stock.


Frank Coho, LCPC #405, personally knows Amish-Mennonites They live near #322, in the Weaverland Church area. They resulted from one of several schisms that have occurred when some Amish had more liberal 'wants' which were unacceptable to the main stream.

An informative note from AIma Eby, LCPC #228, says the Amish-Mennonites are better known as Beachy Amish, (a name Frank also used). Alma goes on to say "they broke away...in the 1920's and dress conservatively but have cars, electricity, telephones and other modern conveniences". She doubts if they have TV's and goes on to say "They have a congregation and school near Bird-in-Hand, 3/4 ml. north of Rte. #340."

Alma sold Kempf's postcards through her stand at Green Dragon back in the 1980's. She says there are others "but the ones you have pictured were the best". She judged Greg to have been in his 30's and is quite likely around - someplace.

Dot Fry,LCPC #59, knows she has a set "somewhere". OK, Dot, it's Spring. Can I give you a hand Spring housecleaning?

"Dear Mrs. Healmsted, received your letter some time ago but have been so buisy have not had time to write. Thought I would send you card and let you know that we are all alive

Mr. Smith is better but not well yet yes he thinks sees the same little girl he yoused to know I think I wrote you it was through Melvin that we received your first letter if it had not been for him we would never had heard from

It is raining very hard up here to day

Dont your Mother remember the time she was up to our house after we were married ask her if she remembers how I looked

Well I must close for this time hopeing to here from

We remain as ever your unknown friends Mr. and Mrs. Smith"




