# HEADS UP IN BRITTANY!



Lacy coiffes are a tall order in Pays Bigoudenux, France.

Brittany, a relatively isolated region of France's extreme northwest, is home to a million natives. The small towns have boasted a rich tradition of textile arts since the Middle Ages, including the renowned Bayeux tapestry (THE CARD, December 2016).












The region is famous for its variety of traditional costumes; officially there are 66. But our interest centers on old (and new) postcards that features the headgear – coiffe. Many of the headdresses are named for particular villages like Carhaix, Saint –Malo, Pont Aven, Pontivy and Pays Baigouden in the Quimper region. In the latter village, the starched coiffes can be 16" high.





During the 19<sup>th</sup> century the tall lace bonnet worn by women became famous, it covered only the top of the skull and extended to a triangle of fabric mounted on a base and were often embroidered with patterns of flowers. By around 1900 this had evolved into a tall sugarloaf shape. In the early 20<sup>th</sup> century the cap became even taller, reaching fifteen to twenty centimeters in the late 1920s and even taller just after the Second World War.







For the last two generations, most of the fancy finery shows up only at important festivals and folklore events. But a handful of elderly women still enjoy showing off their fancy work every day. Bless them!











## BERNHARDT WALL




Bernhardt Wall was born in Buffalo, New York in 1872.


He began his artistic work with the Ullman Company and only later were his Illustrations used on postcards. Eventually his postcard work was published by fifteen companies. He is said to have done over 5000 postcards and would become known as the "Postcard King".

He was famous for comic cards and especially for two series of cards i.e. "Little Breeches" and the Sunbonnets.

He died in Los Angeles in 1956.
