8 May: The History of Printing on Stamps: A **Topical Study-Joseph Sullivan**

Joseph Sullivan is a lifelong, worldwide stamp collector with special interest in the graphic arts and printing as related to philately. He is also a serious collector of Poster Stamps. Joe is a member of the APS, ATA, Baltimore Philatelic Society, Graphics Philately Association, and Europa Study Unit. He is the editor of and contributor to Philateli-Graphics, the award-winning quarterly journal of the Graphics Philately Association. Within the last year, he created the stampsite.org website where he writes regularly about philatelic topics that particularly interest him (and hopefully you too, so check it out.) Joe is also an ATA Ambassador and annual

Professionally, Joe's career has consisted of work in graphic design, photography, printing, printing management, and consulting. This background leads directly to the program, "The History of Printing on Stamps," which he will be bringing to PSLC. The talk will trace the development of printing from its earliest appearances, through a variety of substrates, different reproduction methods, and technological developments to today's era of digital reproduction. You'll see the printed word and illustration on stamps as well as some of the printing devices and the equip-



23 May: Buffalo Cinderellas-Rick Barrett

PSLC is pleased to have author Rick Barrett speak to us tonight about his recent book (2018) Buffalo Cinderellas: The Gentleman, The Huckster and the Pan American Exposition.



This book and presentation will fill several needs. For those who like biography, there is the story of these two men, juxtaposed through their roles at the fair...Both produced promotional labels (also known as Cinderellas) for the Buffalo Expo.

One went on to become a stamp dealer and publisher of worldwide reputation with a specialty in the Confederate States. He was known for his catalogs.

The other man, the Huckster turned to a variety of philatelic related persuits, some of them very shady. When finally convicted, it was for what is known as stamp washing. This is the taking of used stamps and using chemical means to remove the cancels to sell as mint stamps, mostly for postage. Finally imprisoned, he died shortly after his release in 1930.

Both presidential historians and World's Fair buffs will be sated. The coverage of the 1901 Pan American Expo in Buffalo, NY is excellent.

Unfortunately, U.S. President William McKinley was shot by an anarchist on 6 September 1901 and died a week later.

Finally, there is the discussion of the fabrication and sales of the beautiful labels as seen below.

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1st Grade Presentation

Recently, I had the honor of visiting my daughter's 1st grade class to talk about stamp collecting. The teacher was very receptive to the idea from the start, and I was pleasantly surprised to see four or five hands go up when I asked the children if anyone collected stamps. Indeed, I told them that stamp collecting was once the most popular children's hobby, which the many of us who started collecting as kids can attest to.

In preparation for my visit, I put together identical packets for each of the students. The packets included a few of my favorite stamps to talk about, inexpensively mounted on a manila envelope, a paper I prepared with comments about each of them to help the students remember their significance, an envelope of loose Prexies, and a Lancopex advertising postcard provided by the club.

The students were very attentive and engaged throughout our discussion, and I was able to make my 20 minutes with them a learning experience for all of us. In talking about my favorite president, Thomas Jefferson, and my favorite stamps of the Bicentennial, I found that a few of them might have an aptitude for history. We even practiced counting by fives on an old block of German inflation stamps. When I told them about FDR, our stamp collecting president, and his "Win the War" stamp, I found that they had an awareness of their grandparents and other family members who have served in the military.

Talking about an assortment of a dozen loosely related stamps provided an opportunity for the children to explore several different disciplines, and my hope is that, like Jefferson, they become curious about the many different things life has to offer them, and take from that a life-long interest in learning. Perhaps a few of them were able to make it to our Lancopex show, which the teacher helped me to promote, and choose some stamps to use to start or add to their own collection?

One of the books that I showed the students was the Boy Scout (BSA) Stamp Collecting merit badge pamphlet. The recent past and →

→current statistics behind the badge might be an indicator of the general state of the hobby with young people. In a good year, only about 800 to 1000 scouts are currently earning it. However, in the history of the BSA, almost 400,000 boys have earned it (the APS worked with the BSA to develop the badge in 1922). With the BSA program having recently been opened up to girls, there's an even bigger pool of potential candidates.

My daughter's teacher told me that she was going to give her stamp packet to her son, who has a stamp collection housed in an album that someone gave to him. I've thought about how one can despair about how little market value the most common items in our collections have, or that one can use that as motivation to provide an inexpensive philatelic gift to a special child in our lives; the value of a small packet of stamps to a child's imagination could be enormous!

Lancopex '19 in Review: Another Great Show

It was the usual start to the annual show at 4:15 at the storage facility with Bill and Paul complaining about the boxes of exhibit frames getting heavier again this year! But they were pleased that the promised rain did not appear.

Once at the Farm & Home Center, they were met with the regulars who were deciding how the table layout should go. There, too, they found the tables to be heavier!

But once the doors opened on Friday morning, attendance grew to a record level; ditto on Saturday. (See separate article regarding the results of the dealer survey.) 241 ticket holders plus many club members visited the show. This is up from 233 last year.

This year we offered a "Club Special." Join for 2019 and 2020 is free!! This must have worked as we got 10-11 new members compared to the 3-4 we typically enroll each year at the show.

2019 Lancopex **Dealer's Survey**

An annual component of Lancopex is our Dealer's Survey, a metric and narrative instrument that helps us keep on our toes. This year we had 22 vendors that

included the USPOD and Food Service. Surveys were given to all, and 19 responded (86.3%) and 17 of the 19 respondents signed (optional) their surveys (89.5.0%). ◆Did you meet your financial goals? 17 of 19 said yes (89.5%). The follow-up queried what hindered them from meeting their goals. One commented that key customers did not attend, and the

thought he had a poor location on

the bourse floor. ♦ What would you recommend for future shows? Here most of the dealers commented that the show was great and little change, if any, was needed. One said that there was nothing wrong with the show; it was just that customers did not stop at his table. A dealer said he would like more space, while another thought "wine and cheese would be nice."

♦ What is special about Lancopex? There were some general comments about the location of the show and good attendance. "It is a professionally run show." Almost all commended the club members and show committee and the work that they put into the show as significant to success. "I'm not sure what it is, but keep it up." One dealer noted that he gets to see his friends at the show: customers, club members, and other dealers.

◆On the food and beverage service ...the applause was unanimous. It was great. Many offered Kudos to Truyde Greiner for covering their lunches again this year.

♦On a scale of 1 (poor) to 10 (best) how does Lancopex compare to other shows of a similar **venue?** The scores ranged from 7 to 15; the latter was rounded to 11. There were 2-7s, 5-9s, and the rest 11-10s (and 1-11). The average was ...9.47/10.0

This is up from 9.42 of last year ('18) which had been the best to date. The two 7s were awarded by the two dealers who reported that they did not meet their goals for

What a Show! - The past few weeks were busy ones, with our monthly meeting on April 10th. Nearly 60 members and guests were treated to an informal discussion on the Joys of Philately by Bill Schultz, philatelic judge, writer, speaker, collector, curator, and more than 50-year exhibitor. He opened the session with a music video of a rendition of "Unchained Melody" by the Alle Orchester bei der

Musikschau der Nationen, recorded in 2002 in Bremen, Germany. Bill then followed with an overview of postal history, postal systems, the movement of mail via different modes of transportation (water, rail, horseback), discussed cancels and devices, and the postal rates and stamps that covered the cost of this enterprise. Bill then passed around the room his wonderful exhibit pages of covers and letters from West Chester, PA. Moreover, Bill intro-

duced a Single-Frame Exhibit on "Ft. Delaware POW's Postal History". This newly-created exhibit which Bill helped to curate for a collector, contained many unique items sent from the Fort by Confederate (and Union traitor) prisoners of war during the Civil War. The material was rare and unique and has never been exhibited before. A most enjoyable evening was had by all, with photos available on our website. The Society is looking forward to Bill's next visit!

We closed out the month with our 34th Annual Stamp Show and Exhibition - LANCOPEX 2019. And what a Stamp Show it was! I thoroughly enjoyed spending time with many of you and meeting our guests. We signed up at least 10 new members and enticed many more to attend our monthly meetings. The exhibition hall was abuzz with activity, smiling Dealers and Collectors alike. Our friends from the USPS were in attendance, a broad array of Exhibits and Displays were mounted to whet our appetite, not to mention the concession and all those tasty treats. I do hope you picked up some goodies for your collections.

Elsewhere in this newsletter you'll find the final tally

of attendees, the Dealer Survey results, and affiliate feedback. I hope you were smiling while our ad hoc photography crew took photos of the Show, which are posted on our website to memorialize the event.
