Word games were popular during the Golden Age of Postcards as a way of sending some light-hearted humor to a friend. Some of the most popular were rebuses and riddles. Rebuses are words that are represented by pictures substituted for words and letters. For example: This 1905 postcard says: "I hope to be back soon."



Another example that illustrates the rebus is the sentence "I can see you" by using the pictographs of "eye—can—sea—ewe." The October presentation given by Betty Beck will illustrate rebuses and riddles that are sometimes funny and sometimes challenging.

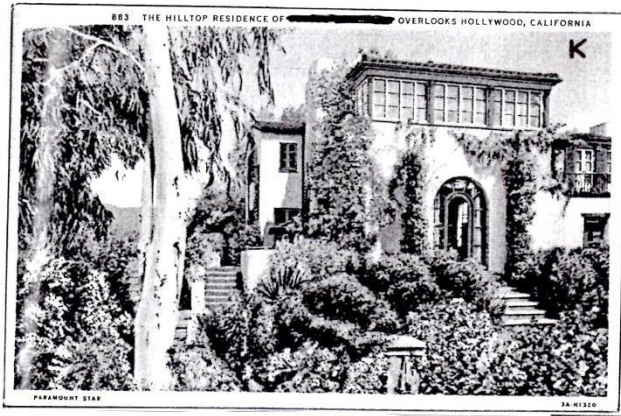

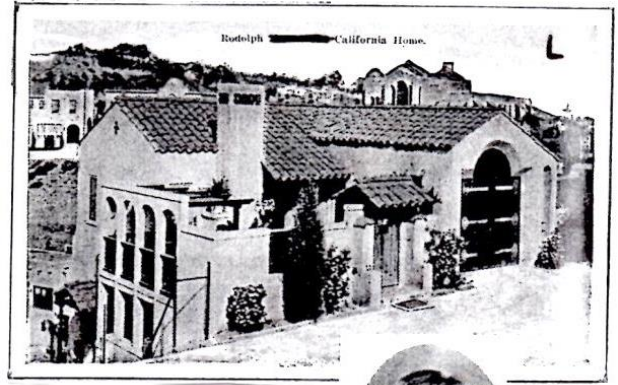
HOLLYWOOD HOMES on POSTCARDS - PART II

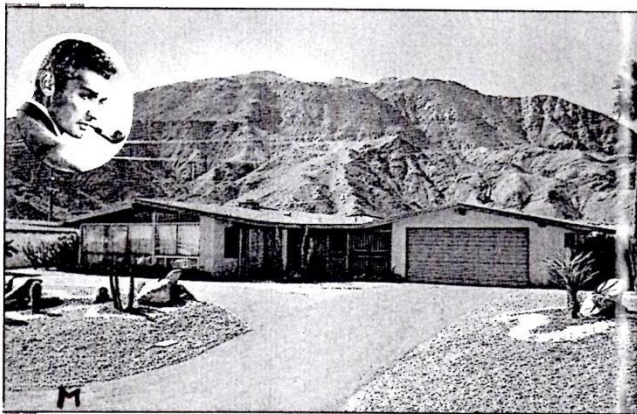
By popular demand, we continue our showing of Stars and their homes from the early days to the 1940s. Most PCs are from the Linen Era, a few are chromes.



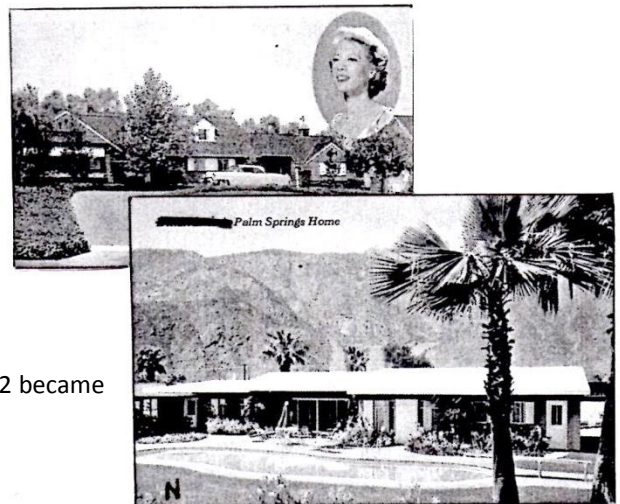
11.) He was an unassuming leading man in comedies of the 1920s. His career took off in a 1935 Western that endorsed the genre for decades.



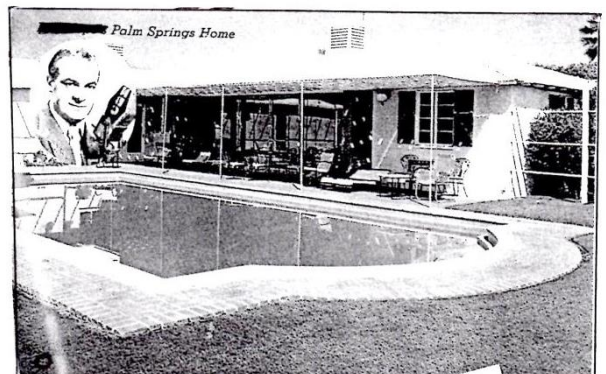
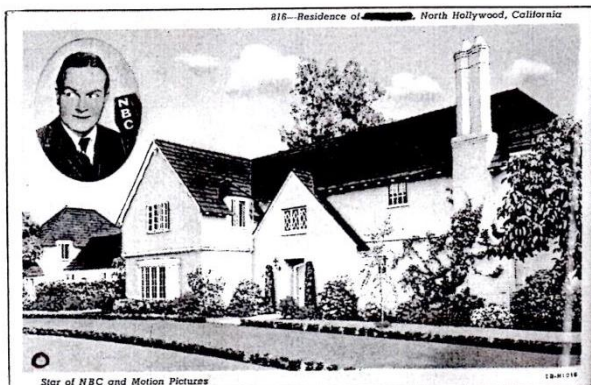
12.) Their home was "Pickfair." His career centered on silent comedies, she was America's Sweetheart." They eventually teamed up with Chaplin as United Artists.



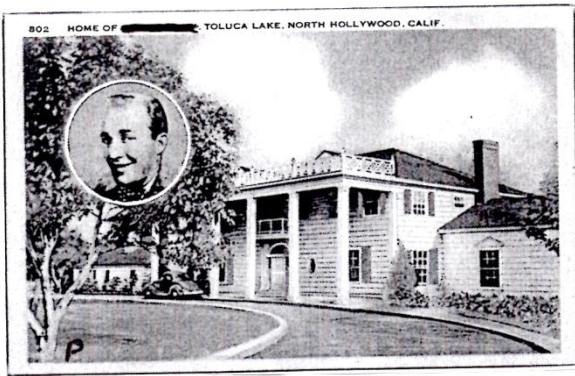
13.) This heartthrob never lost his appeal when his hair turned grey. Following spinal surgery, he died at just forty-two.



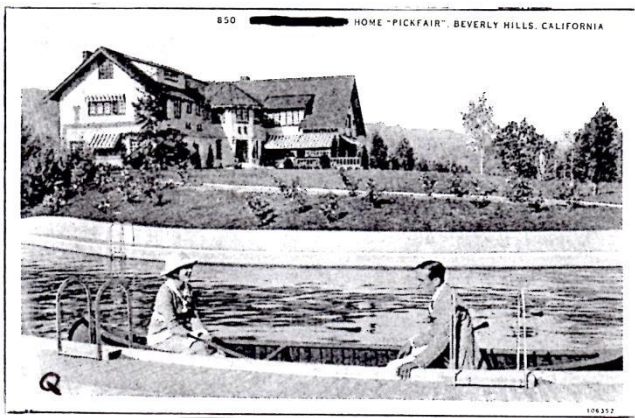
14.) He recorded more than 1,700 songs; 368 made the charts; 42 became Hit #1. His two big Christmas songs help buy him two houses.



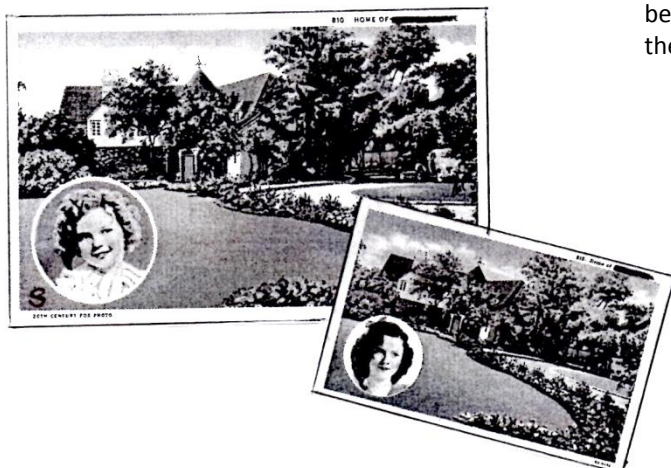
15.) "The Mexican Spitfire" was a beauty of the 1920s through 1944 when she committed suicide.



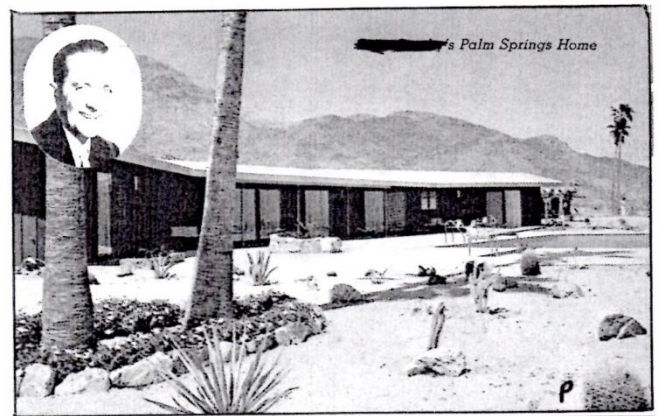

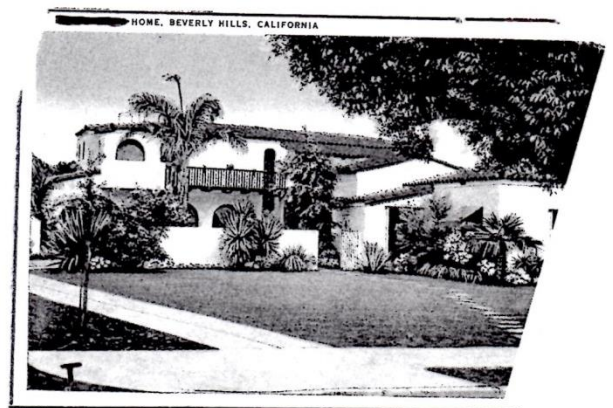
16.) She made her debut in 1933, earned an Oscar in 1934, and continued in drama & comedies thru the 80s.

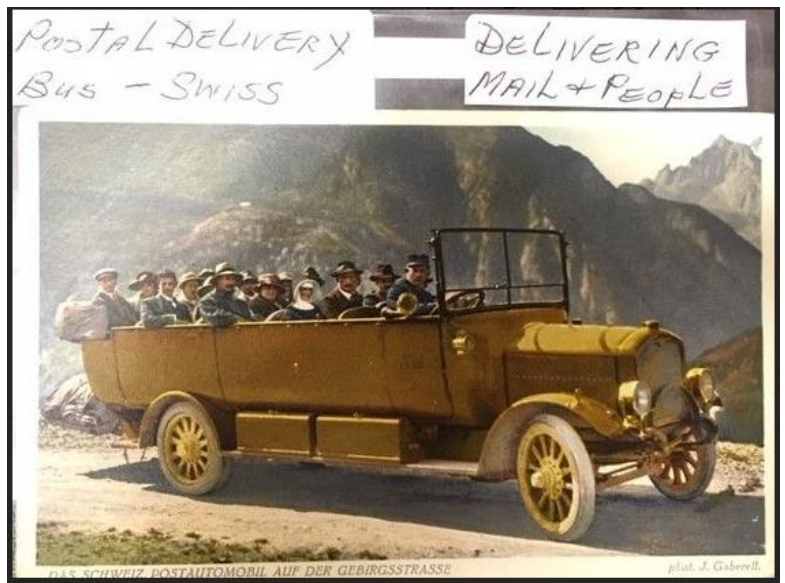
