FLAG DAY



People across the United States celebrate Flag Day on June 14 each year to honor the United States flag and to commemorate the flag's adoption. On the same day, the United States Army celebrates its birthday. The President will issue a proclamation designating June 11 to June 17 as National Flag Week. In 2018, it will be the week of June 10 to June 16.


Deciding when and who was responsible for the "first" Flag Day can be a headache. Let their ghosts fight it out. Let us, the living, appreciate the day/week by flying the stars and stripes and protect it as our patriotic little guy by artist Charles Twelvetrees is doing — "That's my flag — and I dare anybody to say anything against it."


Again, without fussing about who was responsible for the "first" stars and stripes, many postcards attribute the work of Betsy Ross, niece of Lancaster's George Ross, as an early maker of the American flag, often known as Old Glory.





The larger postcard image isn't often seen. It's a woodcut by Thorton Oakley and is #3 in a series by the Phila. Art Alliance. It reports that the Betsy Ross Memorial Association, at that time, had 1,833,000 members.





In 1916 President Woodrow Wilson called for a nationwide observance of Flag Day on June 14. In 1949 President Truman signed legislation proclaiming June 14 as Flag Day. In 1966, Congress also requested that the President issue annually a proclamation designating the week in which June 14 occurs as National Flag Week.

The Living Flag PC is composed by hundreds of sailors. It would be a great addition to anyone's American Flag collection.







Of the remaining three flag postcards in our story, Columbia, holding the stars and stripes is the one most often found. Typist Miss Liberty is seldom found, as is the little girl with her patriotic dollies.




HAPPY FATHER's Day

Did you know:

- **Father's Day** is a celebration honoring fathers and celebrating fatherhood, paternal bonds, and the influence of fathers in society.
- The first Father's Day observed in June was June 19, 1910, in Spokane, Washington.
- In 1916, President Woodrow Wilson and his family personally observed the day. The first bill was introduced in Congress in 1913, but in spite of encouragement by President Woodrow Wilson, it did not pass.
- Eight years later, President Calvin Coolidge signed a resolution in favor of Father's Day "to establish more intimate relations between fathers and their children and to impress upon fathers the full measure of their obligations."
- In 1966, President Lyndon Johnson signed an executive order that the holiday be celebrated on the third Sunday in June.
- Under President Richard Nixon, in 1972, Congress passed an act officially making Father's Day a national holiday.
- It's the fourth biggest day for greeting cards; after Christmas, Valentine's Day and Mother's Day.
- Humor Cards account for 25% of Father's Day greetings.
- North America is not the only place where Father's Day is celebrated. In traditionally Catholic countries such as Spain and Portugal, Father's Day is observed on March 19, the Feast of St. Joseph. In Germany, men drink all day at beer gardens. In Thailand, Father's Day occurs on the king's birthday, which for current King Bhumibol Adulyadej is December 5 and everyone wears yellow.







EXAGGERATIONS AND TALL-TALES on PCs

An exaggeration PC illustrates an object of disproportionate size. The tall-tale PC added a caption.

Alfred Stanley Johnson Jr. and Wm. H. Martin are two of the more popular creators of these postcards.

How? One wide-shot and one close-up photo was used. The enlarged close-up image was cut and glued onto the wide-shot to create a humorous result.

Above – Cousin Fud Marketing a load of potatoes. Van Buren, Arkansas. Home of Bob Burns.

Center - We use big bait here (Twin Oaks Lodge, Fernleigh, Ontario.)


Below – The colored printed PC shows corn being loaded on railroad cars – one ear on each car! (no publ.)

"Manipulated" PCs were most popular in the US from 1900 to 1917 but continued, to a lesser scale, into the 1930s.










Missouri Apples, by W. H. Martin, was sent in 1909 from Merriam, KS to Lexington, MO. The actual billboard reads "Use a Wonder Wringer Washer."

Ride-Em Cowboy is by E.D. Conrad, Garden City, KS and sent in 1938 to Newberg, Oregon.





Bringing in the Sheaves is by W.H. Martin. It was sent from Aberdeen, SD in 1908 to Cecil, WI. "I think I will go to N.Dakota, there is too many men here looking for work."
