COLLECTING POST CARDS as a "NEWBIE"

I have always had a big interest in traveling. As a young child, I was fascinated reading about parts of the U.S. beyond my home in rural Lancaster County. My parents did not travel – back in the '40's little was known of parents getting a "paid" vacation in my little world. Any vacation time my father took was the beginning of hunting season and that did not include children. His hunting ground was neighboring fields – no need to send post cards back home from here (even if there were some available) as we were used to roaming these same fields and were quite familiar with the countryside.

I don't remember when or who sent us post cards but I do know that a relative was known to travel – this was my mother's Aunt; I don't remember meeting her but I do have a post card that she mailed from Glacier National Park to my grandmother. I visited that site when I worked in Glacier as a seasonal worker at the camp store near Lake McDonald in the summer of 2010 and was surprised to learn that the lodge shown in my mother's Aunt's card of St. Mary's Lake was never at that location. I learned from a park service employee that cards were sometimes made of a painting and the scene could have been painted from the artist's imagination.

I'm not sure when I started to collect post cards myself (perhaps it was when I was in 8th grade geography class – one of my favorite subjects) but I find that I am fascinated with them. A friend and I enjoy visiting the post card shows and usually come home with more than we had intended to buy; we just can't resist adding to our collections and ponder starting another. When expressing my lack of knowledge to a fellow club member, he said "just buy what you like".

My current collection is of National Parks; my largest collection is of Yellowstone, one of my favorite places. Having worked there for a number of summers, I feel like it is my second home. As I learn about post cards, I'm collecting older ones and am finding them to be a pictorial education of the places that I am learning to love.

My recent acquisitions include exciting purchases made at the recent Lancaster show. They include scenes of sites that no longer exist in Yellowstone Park and I really like learning the history of the park thru the scenes. Some of my recent favorites include:

The Liberty Cap (a dormant geyser) and Mammoth Hot Springs Hotel. A lot of this hotel has changed thru the years and is currently undergoing additional renovations. The horses and carriages were early modes of transportation thru the park.





Another view of the Mammoth Hot Springs Hotel. Only the 4-story extension on the right end of the hotel remains as a hotel The cabins at Mammoth Hot Springs Hotel. I believe these are still in use, although they have been renovated.





The Grand Canyon Hotel was a very large beautiful facility, located near the Upper & Lower Falls of the Yellowstone River. A one mile walk took you around the outside of the hotel. The grounds in this area became unstable due to thermal activity and it had to be closed. After several years, it burnt to the ground.

Old Faithful Inn contains bedrooms today that look much like the one in this card. Rooms in the "old house" do not have private baths but most have sinks with running water. Showers and toilets are "down the hall." These rooms are most sought after and may contain 2 or 3 double beds. Two wings were added in later years with private baths.





This early steamboat was used to take tourists to see the scenery on Lake Yellowstone, the largest body of water in North America at this altitude, which is 8,000 feet above sea level.
