LITTLE NEMO in SLUMBERLAND




Zenas Winsor (no D) McCay founded his masterpiece, Little Nemo in Slumberland, on a simple premise: each night Nemo is carried in dream to Slumberland, and each morning he is brought back to earth by the rude shock of awakening.

In the course of his wanderings he meets Flip, the green grimacing dwarf, Impy, the cannibal, Silvers, the dog, the quackish Dr. Pill, Morpheus, King of Slumberland, and his daughter, the Princess (whose name we never know).

The comic ran from Oct. 15, 1905 to Dec. 26, 1926 alternately in the NY Herald and NY American.











Nemo on Postcards
The only vintage postcards we have are the 12 cards in Tuck's Little Nemo Series 6, and these are not attributed to McCay. All you need do is compare them with images in the elomgated cards on pages 4,5 and 6. Even so, popularity of Nemo has kept them in demand. The original set is copyrighted in 1907 by the NY Herald. All are Valentines
Mashburn's 2003 value: \$25-35 ea.


McCay's first popular attempt at comic strips was Little Sammy Sneeze, the final panel being a disastrous result. The strip ran from July 1904 to Dec. 1906. Graphically, McCay creates the dream's sensations: the sense of free fall, of flight, the feeling of dizziness, of estrangement. In the two panels below Nemo says "I wish I were brave like you!" Flip replies, "A whole lot of people are wishing the same thing." Nemo continues, "We've hit something. Oh! Oh!." Flip, "Just as I thought it would do! Stumble over something!"



McCay's birth years vary - 1867, 1869, 1871. Appearing in good health, the five foot McCay complained to his wife on July 26, 1934 of head pain and his right (drawing) arm becoming paralized. He lost consciousness and died the same day of a cerbral embolism. A few years earlier he wrote to fellow cartoonist, Clare Briggs, his own epittaph "I could not keep myself from drawing."



Little Nemo's success had been immediate. In 1906 an expensive musical was written with music by Victor Herbert.




In 1909 the untiring mind led McCay into a new career: animated cartoons - Little Nemo, Gerie the Trained Dinosaur, and in 1917 the first feature-length film cartoon, The Sinking of the Lustitania. McCay toured the vaudeville circuit doing chalk talks and showing his animated cartoons in NYC where he shared a bill with W.C.Fields and Houdini.

It was a elongated postcard from this little set that I received from Louise Wile that prompted this article. Louise kindly followed with four more. Their original size is 4" x 9 1/4" and have recently been listed on Amazon's website for \$17.85 used per set and \$59.90 new. (Set of 30 PCs)

The always-innocent, always-generous Nemo was usually shadowed by the mischievous Flip, a puckish chap whose original role was to ride a nightmare into Nemo's dreams and summon the dawn to awaken the boy. He soon became a friend - of sorts - prone to slap stick predicaments needing Nemo's intercession.




The huge lobster and half a dozen mermaids have centered their attention on Flip. Nemo, our hero, calls, "No! No! No! Don't hurt him! No! He's my worst enemy but don't hurt him! Please don't!"




In 1995 the USPS issued a set of 20ϕ postal cards including this of Little Nemo. The printed stamp duplicates this scene.




McCay was a remarkable cartoonist who could depict plausible explosions, carnage, abd tumult without relying on sound-effects lettering. Here we see Nemo in plumed helmet with sword standing back-to-back with Flip dressed in royal robe and crown. Flip - I wonder if there's a white flag of truce around here anywhere!

Princess - This is my little play mate, Nemo. Is Jack Frost in? The guard - Jack Frost is awaiting you and Little Nemo in the throne room of his beautiful Palace of Ice.
An otherise mundane exchange is depicted in architectural elegance, floral and icy splendor, an evocative moonshine casting shadows.



Previous to Nemo, McCay drew Dream of the Rarebit Fiend, but due to contractual reasons, he worked under the pen name Silas.

On the reverse of each PC a small remark appears at the top of the address section and shows Nemo as he awakens. Cigar-smoking Flip appears in each "letter rate" stamp box.



To some it might seem to be the height of creativity- to "invent" genus and species, whole classifications of life forms. In this Winsor McCay reveled, and Little Nemo was a veritable Noah's Ark. of creatures somewhat human or mostly animal.

"Um, The Freckled Chump. He has never been able to get used to his condition here where he has been six hundred years. His tail is spiked down I see! Well, in a way you can not blame him! He can't forget that's what ails him! It's on his mind."

Some episodes Nemo dreamed himself as a giant; other times he was a fleck on the landscape.
"There's a wise old bird! Is he savage? He looks rather mean!"
"No. He is not savage nor wise" is the reply. "He does not know he's alive! We call him The Boob! He absolutely does not know a single thing! Doesn't know enough to eat or sleep! His head is solid bone! He simply knows nothing at all!"
