The new "Club Certificates" were given out to the winners of the postcard competition on "Clowns" as well as to all prior 2014 winners.





A little gem of postcard information appeared in a 1912 magazine (title unknown) which we reproduce in this story. The twelve (12) PCs "are printed on heavy art stock, hand-colored, with button faces, and each card in an envelope. List price \$8.33 per 100." A guess would be the PCs retailed for 15 cents. Though not mentioned the art is definitely by Grace Harlow; many of them are signed. Are readers aware of any others by Harlow? Let's hear from you.

There are several with minor variations in their poem that note reference to the Wanamaker Store. (W) They are dated 1909. The cars are found w/o buttons attached and show Jervis faces.

Mr. Bertie Button (Man in suit with vest & cane) Sorry, print not legible.


