"SELLERY" ON POSTCARDS

In her letter to friend Betsy, Juliana Smith described her 1779 Thanksgiving meal that included an exotic vegetable "Which I do not believe you have seen yet. Uncle Simeon had imported the Seede from England before the war began and only this year was there enough for table use. It is called Sellery and you eat it without cooking."



Having "something raw" like Celery, was a marker for a special occasion. At the beginning it was not an "everyday" food. Often accompanied with olives, the foods were for a Sunday meal or when guests visited.

Train transportation made celery available to the average family. A big bunch was 10 cents in 1923 and 19 cents in 1962.

Celery became a "palate cleanser" in between a big meal's rich courses.

Celery and olives were as familiar a pair as jelly and peanut butter. Celery was chilled and curled.

By the 1970s celery became a popular low-fat, low calorie food.

Top Right – Careful, there, young lady (shoes) That's a heavy load!

Top Left (2) & Center – Embossed PCs. Typed message from Harrisburg PC Factory offer these PCs for 2 cents each: tinsled 5 cents Xmas for \$1.50 per 100, assorted.
