






The 375<sup>th</sup> Anniversary did not rate a stamp, but at least got a postmark.






The Pilgrim Fathers
1999 Great Britain Millennium Issue



In 1606 King James I and VI required all British ships to fly this "King's Colours" flag from the maintop. Ships could fly their Country's colours – St. George's Cross for England and St. Andrews Cross for Scotland - from the fore-top. Use of this flag ended in 1649 with the execution of Charles I, but was re-instated in 1660 by Charles II.

Following the Act of Union in 1707 it became the national flag of Great Britain.



390th Anniversary of the Pilgrims' First Thanksgiving

The Pilgrim Monument in Provincetown, Mass.

The cornerstone was laid in 1905 by Pres. T. Roosevelt and it was completed in 1910. The Monument is 252 ft. 7.5 in. tall and has 116 steps. It is the tallest all-granite structure in the US. The granite came from Stonington, ME. The design is patterned after the Torre Del Mangia in Siena, Italy.











fig. 6 — Color sketch. The blues of winter.
